<u>Minutes of the meeting of the State Level Steering Committee (SLSC) of the State</u> <u>Compensatory Afforestation Fund Management and Planning Authority (CAMPA),</u> <u>Assam held on 4th June, 2021 in the Conference Room of the Chief Secretary, Assam</u>

(List of the members present in the meeting is annexed at Annexure-I.)

The Chief Secretary, Assam and the Chairman, State Level Steering Committee (SLSC) of State CAMPA welcomed the members of the Committee and asked the PCCF & HoFF, Assam to initiate the discussion. Thereafter, the PCCF & HoFF, Assam gave a brief background of CAMPA and asked the CEO, CAMPA to start the agenda wise presentation.

The Addl. PCCF and CEO, State CAMPA, Assam elaborated the background of the State CAMPA and gave a PowerPoint presentation on the agenda items before the Members of the Committee. The presentation also included the activities undertaken under CAMPA since inception and present fund position. The Committee after a detailed discussion on the Agenda items arrived at the following conclusion.

Agenda Items No. 1: <u>Conformation of minutes of last State Level Steering Committee (SLSC)</u> meeting held on 11.03.2020.

The CEO, State CAMPA, Assam stated that the minutes of the last State Level Steering Committee meeting held on 11th March, 2020 was circulated vide this office letter No. FG.27/CAMPA/SLSC/2019-20, Dated 18.03.2020 to all the Members of the meeting. As no comments on the minutes have been received from any Member, the minutes have been placed before the Committee for approval. The Committee conformed and accepted the same.

Agenda Items No. 2: <u>Action Taken Report of the last State Level Steering Committee meeting</u> <u>held on 11.03.2020.</u>

The CEO, State CAMPA, Assam elaborated about the actions taken on the suggestions received at the last State Level Steering Committee meeting. Regarding the drawal of Rs. 5.16 lakhs for radio collaring of wild elephants incorporated in the Agenda Item No. – 6 of the last meeting, the CEO, CAMPA proposed to include the same in the Annual Plan of Operation (APO) of 2021-22. The Committee approved the same and accepted the Action Taken Report.

Agenda Items No. 3: <u>Approval of the decision taken by the Chief Secretary –cum-Chairman,</u> <u>SLSC regarding maintenance of plantations and nurseries</u> <u>departmentally.</u>

As tenders were floated by the respective divisions, due to the stringent eligibility criteria the tender process could not be initiated for non receipt of tenders which led to slow down in the maintenance of the committed activities (plantations and nurseries) which are seasonal and time bound. In this regard, a proposal was sent to the Chief Secretary-cum-Chairman, State Level Steering Committee (SLSC) in file seeking approval to carry out maintenance of committed activities (Plantations and nurseries) departmentally. The Chief Secretary-cum-Chairman, SLSC had approved the same and asked to place it before SLSC meeting. Accordingly, the decision was approved in the meeting.

The PCCF &HoFF, Assam-cum-Member of the Committee mentioned that, all the plantation works including its maintenance should be allowed to be carried out departmentally and only fencing and other infrastructure works should be done through contractors. He also stated some of the difficulties being faced by the contractors hired for the aforesaid works which would lead to failure of the plantations. Moreover, he stated that most of the States of the country are doing the plantation works departmentally. It is to be stated that majority of plantation related fund goes into erection of fencing. For example, in the APO of 2020-21, out of Rs.47.00 crore, nearly Rs. 13.00 crore is meant for advance work and site nursery only and the remaining Rs. 34.00 crore is meant for fencing and other infrastructure. The Chairman suggested that the matter be taken up with the Finance Department after ascertaining the practice in various states.

Agenda Items No. 4: Approval of the Annual Plan of Operation (APO) for the year 2021-22.

As the main mandate of the meeting was the approval of the Annual Plan of

Operation of 2021-22, the CEO, State CAMPA informed that the APO for 2021-22 was prepared and placed before the State Level Executive Committee (SLEC) held on 13.04.2021. Certain modifications were made by the State Level Executive Committee and accordingly the APO has been reframed and placed before SLSC, with an amount of Rs.96.20 Crores.

Going through all the activities incorporated in the APO, the Commissioner and Secretary, Environment & Forests asked whether an increase in the total amount of the APOis possible by including some important activities. The CEO, CAMPA stated that the APO is prepared on basis of the proposals received from the Divisions forwarded through the Wing Heads of the Department and placed before SLEC and approved as per the CAF, Rules, 2018. However, inclusion of certain activities is possible if approved by the SLSC. In this regard, the Chairman of the Committee suggested to include purchase of 10 nos. of Satellite Phones and construction of prefabricated camps for strengthening of border area development. Accordingly, all the items included in the APO have been approved. The APO after including the items as suggested by the Committee is given blow:

Agenda Items No. 5: Approval of Annual Report of State CAMPA, Assam of 2019-20.

Regarding the Annual Report of State CAMPA, Assam, 2019-20 the CEO, State CAMPA stated that, as per the Compensatory Afforestation Fund Rules, 2018, the Annual Report has to be submitted to the National CAMPA every financial year. Therefore, a draft Annual Report has been prepared and placed before the Committee. The same had also been accepted by the State Level Executive Committee held on 13.04.2021.

The Committee approved the same.

Agenda Items No. 6: Acceptance of Audit Report for the year 2018-19.

The CEO, State CAMPA mentioned that, the audit report for the year 2018-19 was received from the Chartered Accountant and has been placed before the Committee. The same had also been placed before the SLEC held on 13.04.2021 and after scrutiny the SLEC had already accepted the same.

The Committee accepted the same.

Agenda Items No. 7: Monitoring and Evaluation Report for the year 2017-18 and 2018-19.

The CEO, State CAMPA stated that the Monitoring and Evaluation of the works implemented by different Divisions under State CAMPA, Assam are conducted by a Third Party. Accordingly, the said work has been conducted by "Green Initiatives Certification And Inspection Agency, Noida" for the years 2017-18 and 2018-19. The agency has submitted the final

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report and has been placed before the Committee showing the overall scorings and observations. The final report had been placed before the SLEC and had been accepted.

The Committee accepted the same.

Agenda Items No. 8: Any other matter with permission of the Chair.

1. Suggestion from representative of the Principal Secretary to the Govt. of Assam, Environment and Forest Department regarding increasing the size of APO was noted. Accordingly it was suggested to create a new 1.5 ha. nursery in a suitable area under North Kamrup Division as there is no nursery in the Division for distribution of seedlings. In this regard, the CEO, State CAMPA stated that, there were in total 97 nos. of nurseries created and maintained under State CAMPA, Assam from 2009-10. But, in the year 2019 as suggested by the SLSC, the no. of nurseries has been reduced to 70 nos. and again it has been reduced to 32 nos. as per decision of the Forest Department. He stated that, for creation of any new nursery the same must be included in the Annual Plan of Operation as there is provision in the CAF, Rules, 2018. Besides the above, some provision has also been made for creating connectivity infrastructure in wildlife areas.

2. Regarding distribution of the seedlings, the CEO, State CAMPA stated that, department has fixed some conditions on distribution of seedlings. The matter was discussed in the SLEC meeting held on 13.04.2021 where, the Committee suggested that out of total production of seedlings, 20% of seedlings will be reserved for free distribution and remaining 80% will be kept for sale where preferences will be given to the contractors hired for raising plantation under APFBC project. The Executive Committee decided that maximum of 5 nos. of plants will be given to any individual and 50 nos. of plants to any organization free of cost. If any individual/organization wants more seedlings than as fixed above, they will have to pay Rs. 10/- per seedling.

In this regard, the State Level Steering Committee suggested that provisions must be kept for distribution of seedlings free of cost to some of the Government organizations like defense, military and para-military, etc.

The meeting ended with vote of thanks to the Chair.



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PART-I BRIEF HISTORY AND PAST PERFORMANCE

(a) Brief description of forests and forestry sector in Assam

The state of Assam is located in the north-eastern region of India, has an area of 78,438 Sq. Km., 2.39% of the total geographical area of the country, and has sub-tropical climate. The state can be divided into three physiographic regions, *viz.* Brahmaputra valley, Central Assam Hills and Barak valley.

- **Brahmaputra River Valley** is the northern part of Assam (Covering the north eastern end, central Assam and the western end). The floodplains of the Brahmaputra river covers nearly 72% of the State, bestowing the land with immensely fertile land. Spreading its rich alluvial plains across the length and breadth of Assam, the river makes the State ideal for agriculture as well as forest growth.
- South of the approximate centre of the State lie the **Dima Hasao and KarbiAnglongdistricts** which are separated from the upper valley by a range of hills. The two districts have autonomous councils and are administratively structured to be relatively more independent of the State and central machinery. Earlier known as the North Cachar Hills, they separate the Brahmaputra river valley of the State – the Barak Valley.
- Named after the Barak River, the **Barak Valley** comprises the three southern most districts of Assam. The geography of the valley lends itself to annual flooding, making it both fertile as well presenting a significant risk to life.

Assam is one of the biodiversity-rich areas in the world consisting of tropical rainforests, deciduous forests, riverine grasslands, bamboo orchards and numerous wetland eco systems. Forest Survey of India has mapped forest types/sub types in the country with reference to Champion and Seth classification using satellite data. As per this assessment, Assam has 18 forest sub-types belonging to five forest type groups:

- Tropical Wet Evergreen.
- Tropical Semi Evergreen.
- Tropical Moist Deciduous.
- Tropical Dry Deciduous.
- Sub-Tropical Pine Forests.

The state has recorded forest area of 28,327 sq. km, which is 36.11% of its geographical area. Within the forest area, the reserved forest and unclassed forests are 66.58% and 33.42% respectively. As per the State of Forest Report (FSI, 2019), the total forest cover in the state is 28,327 sq. km. (36.11% of Geographical area), comprising 2795 sq. km very dense forest, 10,279 sq. km moderately dense forest and 15,253 sq. km open forest.

The total carbon stock of forests in the State is 270.15 million tones which is 3.79 % of total forest carbon stock of the country. An increase in total green cover (forest cover and tree cover) has been recorded from 2011 to 2019.



According to the State of the Forest Report 2019, a net increase of 221.51 Km² in forest cover has been observed mainly due to plantations mostly outside forest areas. The decrease in forest cover in some of the districts has also been observed due to rotational felling in tea gardens, shifting cultivations and developmental activities. The forest area is suffering from habitat degradation, encroachments, fuel wood extraction etc. Plantation raised in degraded areas, especially in the *Jhum* areas, face immense biotic pressures.

The Forest Department of Assam is composed of four wings viz. Territorial, Wildlife, Social Forestry and Research Education & Working Plan. The State is divided into 66 forest divisions. There are 33 Territorial, 8 Wildlife, 14 Social Forestry and 11 divisions under Research Education & Working Plan.

(b) Compensatory afforestation, other forestry and related schemes (physical and financial) including catchment area treatment, wildlife management and community development works and activities carried out therein in the State in last five years from the State Fund, in tabular form.

The funds under State CAMPA, Assam received from the Government of India are utilized as per the guidelines of CAMPA. The Annual Plan of Operations are prepared and

submitted in form of NPV (Net Present Value), CA (Compensatory Afforestation), Penal CA etc. and works are undertaken as per the same. In the last five years (**2016-17 to 2020-21**), State CAMPA, Assam has undertaken various activities (Creation and Maintenance), which are mentioned in the following table:

1. Executive Summary

- A. The Assam State CAMPA (Compensatory Afforestation Fund Management and Planning Authority) has been constituted to utilize the fund obtained from Government of India under CAMPA for enhancing forest and tree cover, strengthening, and building infrastructures and logistics facilities, research, training and capacity building and conservation of wildlife. The funds are released directly to Assam State CAMPA from Adhoc CAMPA and allocated to field officer as per the approved APOs.
- B. This Monitoring and Evaluation project is to evaluate the CAMPA-funded activities that were carried out in the period of 2017-18 and 2018-19 by the Assam Forest Department. The project scope comprises the following:
 - Data Collection and Compilation of various activities executed with CAMPA funds
 - Development of key performance indicators (KPIs) and score card matrix, in consultation with State CAMPA authority
 - Field visits for assessment of the selected sites based on KPIs, and collation of data collected during field visits.
 - Comprehensive assessment of various activities.
 - Videography of the selected sites especially of plantation and nursery activities to provide photo evidence of the field.
- C. The work of Monitoring and Evaluation of the CAMPA activities of Assam State was awarded to GICIA India Private Limited by signing an Agreement on 20th February 2020. The launching of the project was, however delayed because of the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic situation and lockdown in the country as well as in Assam State. After gradual opening of lockdown, Assam State CAMPA condoned the delay vide letter No.FG.27/CAMPA dated 03rd July 2020. The Inception Report, the first deliverable of the project was submitted on 20thJuly 2020 which was resubmitted on 25th August 2020 after incorporating few changes recommended by the Assam State CAMPA. The Inception Report was accepted by the CEO of Assam State CAMPA on 10th September 2020, there after the field work started. The Interim Report of the

project was submitted on 27th October 2020 to the Assam State CAMPA, in which the various challenges and bottlenecks faced during the evaluation work was also highlighted. This is the final report which covers the broad methodology & approach followed by the project team for monitoring and evaluation of the State CAMPA activities carried out in the periods of 2017-18 and 2018-19, along with the key findings, outcomes, and recommendations after assessment of the performances of the CAMPA activities.

D. The CAMPA activities found in the assessment periods of 2017-18 and 2018-19 were mainly under four categories, namely Nursery Management, Plantation Management, Infrastructure & Road Development, and Other Works. Nursery Management includes 'Maintenance of nurseries that were created in 2017-18 or in the previous years' and 'Creation of new nurseries in both years of 2017-18 and 2018-19'. Plantation Management includes 'Maintenance of plantations that were created in 2017-18 or the previous years' and 'Creation of new plantations in both years of 2017-18 and 2018-19'. In all, 5 types of plantations were included, namely, Site-Specific Plantations (SSP), Assisted Natural Regeneration (ANR), Afforestation, Sal Coppice, and Apurugiya. Infrastructures & Road Development comprised activities like Antipoaching Camps (APCs), Assam Type Barracks (ATBs), Forest Force Camps (FFCs), Forest Guard Quarters (FGQs), Forester Quarters (FQs), Range Officer Quarter (ROQs), Watch Towers (WTs), Roads and Elephant Proof Trenches (EPTs) constructed in years 2017-18 and 2018-19. Other Works included works of Training, Capacity Developments (TCD) and Staff Amenities (SAs) done in year 2017-18 and 2018-19. As per the terms of reference, 50% of the nurseries, 50% of the plantations, 100% of the infrastructure and roads and 50% of the other works were to be visited and evaluated.

The findings of the evaluation work under the aforementioned categories are summarized as follows:

<u>1. Nursery Management</u>: There were two types of nurseries included for evaluation based on their area, that is, 1.5 ha and 3 ha. A total of 68 nurseries of 1.5 ha area and 29 nurseries of 3 ha area including a 3-ha area nursery cum resource center, both for

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creation and maintenance. Of which, 36 (52.94%) nurseries of 1.5 ha and 16 nurseries (55.17%) of 3 ha including a 3-ha nursery cum resource center were visited and evaluated.

2. Plantation Management:

(i) Site Coverage: As per sampling, ≥50% of each type of plantations (that is, SSP, Afforestation, ANR, Sal Coppice, and Apurugiya) in all Forest divisions were covered. And at least 50% or more patches under each sampled plantation type was covered. A total of **36 SSP**, **49 Afforestation**, **7 ANR**, **14 Sal Coppice**, and **8 Apurugiya plantation** sites, including both maintenance and creation plantations of 2017-18 and 2018-19 periods, were to be evaluated as per the data provided by Assam State CAMPA. Of which, **25 SSP (69.44%)**, **41 Afforestation (83.67%)**, **7 ANR (100%)**, **10 Sal Coppice (71.42%)**, and **8 Apurugiya (100%)** plantation sites were visited and evaluated.

- (ii) Area Coverage: Overall, the total areas under plantation schemes, namely SSP, Afforestation, Sal Coppice, ANR, and Apurugiya plantations, including both maintenance and creation plantations in the periods of 2017-18 and 2018-19, were found to be 2789.36 ha, 1971.5 ha, 825 ha, 300 ha, and 40 ha, respectively. Of which, 1446.51 ha SSP, 1471.5 ha Afforestation, 408 ha Sal Coppice, 300 ha ANR, and 40 ha Apurugiya plantations were visited and evaluated by the field team.
- <u>A. Maintenance:</u> A total area of 2416.67 ha SSP plantations were found to be maintained in both the periods of 2017-18 and 2018-19, including 2132.69 ha in 2017-18 and 1429.25 ha in 2018-19, respectively. Of which, a total of 1118.08 ha area of SSP plantations was evaluated by the project team. Areas of 776.5 ha and 1312 ha of Afforestation plantations were found to be maintained 2017-18 and 2018-19 periods, respectively. However, only 46.5 ha area of above-mentioned

Afforestation plantations was maintained, which was found to be created in the previous monitoring & evaluation period. Of which, **46.5 ha** area has been assessed by the project team. Similarly, areas of **225 ha** and **500 ha of Sal Coppice plantations** were found to be maintained in 2017-18 and 2018-19 periods, respectively, but only **25 ha area** of above-mentioned Sal coppice plantations was maintained, which was found to be created in the previous monitoring & evaluation period. In addition, areas of **50 ha** and **250 ha under ANR plantations** were found to be maintained in 2017-18 and 2017-18 and 2018-19 periods, respectively, and area of **5 ha Apurugiya plantations** was maintained in the previous monitoring in the period 2018-19 period.

B. Creation: An area of 372.69 ha SSP plantations was found to be created in the period of 2018-19 only. Of which, 328.43 ha area of SSP plantations was evaluated. Similarly, total areas of 1925 ha Afforestation, 800 ha Sal Coppice, 300 ha ANR, and 40 ha Apurugiya plantations were found to be created, including both the periods of 2017-18 and 2018-19. Areas of 1010 ha and 915 ha under Afforestation plantations, 475 ha and 325 ha under Sal Coppice plantations, 50 ha and 250 ha under ANR plantations, 20 ha and 20 ha under Apurugiya plantations were found to be created in 2017-18 and 2018 ha under ANR plantations, 475 ha and 325 ha under Sal Coppice plantations, 50 ha and 250 ha under ANR plantations, 20 ha and 20 ha under Apurugiya plantations were found to be created in 2017-18 and 2018-19 periods, respectively. In all, 1425 ha Afforestation, 408 ha Sal Coppice, 300 ha ANR, and 40 ha Apurugiya plantations were covered and assessed.

As per the data provided by Assam State CAMPA, funds for only advance work was released for a total of 140 ha area under Afforestation plantations in the period of 2017-18, which was created in the period of 2018-19, whereas fund for both advance work and creation for 25 ha area under Afforestation plantations was released in the period of 2018-19. Similarly, funds for only advance work was released for a total of 275 ha area under ANR plantations in the period of 2017-18, which was created in the period of 2018-19, whereas fund for both advance work and creation for 25 ha area under ANR plantations was released in the period of 2018-19. On the other hand, funds for only advance work was released for a total of 375 ha area under Sal Coppice plantations in the period of 2017-18, which was created in the period of 2018-19, but fund for both advance work and creation for 50 ha area under Sal Coppice plantations was released in the period of 2017-18. In addition, funds for only advance work was released for 50 ha area under ANR plantations and 50 ha area under Sal Coppice plantations in the period of 2017-18. However, it was informed that funds for creation of these plantations were released in the period of 2018-19. Of which, 50 ha area under ANR plantations and 25 ha area under Sal Coppice plantations were evaluated by the project team.

3. Infrastructures & Road Development: In all, 18 APCs (13 in 2017-18 and 5 in 2018-19), 18 ATBs (10 in 2017-18 and 8 in 2018-19), 2 FFCs (both in 2017-18), 16 FGQs (11 in 2017-18 and 5 in 2018-19), 15 FQs (10 in 2017-18 and 5 in 2018-19), 2 ROQs (both in 2018-19), and 3 WTs (all 3 in 2018-19) building and infrastructures were found in the data provided by Assam State CAMPA for monitoring and evaluation works. All these infrastructures were visited and evaluated, except for only 1 ATB in Digboi division. In addition, 85.5 km under Forest roads (52 km in 2017-18 and 33.5 in 2018-19) and 35 km under EPTs (in 2017-18 only) constructed were also to be evaluated. All the stretches of Forest roads and EPTs were visited and evaluated. Therefore, 98.65% of infrastructure buildings/activities and 100% of roads & EPTs activities were evaluated as part of M&E work.

<u>4. Other Works</u>: The details of 17 Trainings and Capacity Development activities (TCD) and 9 Staff amenities (SAs) were provided for evaluation. Of which, 11 TCDs (64.70%) and 4 SAs (44.44%) were evaluated. In totality, 54.57% of total 'other works' have been assessed & evaluated.

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- E. The overall performance score of an activity is calculated as average of scores for various Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) assigned by the evaluation team during the field visits. Score for each KPI was recorded in the checklist, along with reasoning/justification for the score assigned to that activity. Each KPI was scored on the scale of 0-10, with 10 indicating "complete adherence to the CAMPA objectives & guidelines", 0 indicating "No adherence to the CAMPA guidelines & Objectives", and all other scores indicating a gradation in between as applicable. A master score matrix showing division-wise scores for various activities was prepared and used to draw findings in respect of performance under CAMPA at various levels.
- F. The final findings and overall scores from the assessment of all the activities under the State CAMPA were categorized and analyzed Division level and by activity wise.

2. Introduction

Forest is an important land use in India, covering about 22% of total geographical area of the country (FSI). In addition to timber and non-timber forest products, it supports livelihoods of about 300 million tribal and forest-dependent populations. In a state like Assam, forests occupy 36.11 % geographical area of the State and the recent FSI survey (2019) has indicated a 0.79 % increase from the 2017 assessment. Forests provide several ecosystem services, such as fresh and clean air and water, environment protection, temperature regulation, and cultural services. Forests are also a source of most of the mineral resources required for national development. Many developmental activities such as erection of dams, mining, road, hydro/thermal power plants, irrigation projects, etc. require diversion of forest land. The Government of India enacted a Forest Conservation Act (FCA) in 1980 to put restriction on the diversion of forest land for nonforest purposes by the State/UT Governments. Any project proponent, whether Government or Private, is required to apply for forest clearance (prior approval) to the Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change (MoEFCC) in the prescribed format giving required details including Project's cost-benefit analysis. The proposal is to be submitted through the Forest Department of the concerned State/UT government. Approval under FCA is given subject to compliance of conditions to mitigate the adverse impact of such non-forest uses, including payment for compensatory afforestation (CA) and Net Present Value (NPV) by the project proponent (user agency) for the forest area diverted. The honorable Supreme Court in December 1996 directed - "The term 'forest land' occurring in Section 2, will not only include 'forest' as understood in the dictionary sense, but also any area recorded as forest in the Government records irrespective of its ownership."

As a follow-up of the Honorable Supreme Court order of 30 October 2002, the Ministry of Environment and Forests constituted a Compensatory Afforestation Fund Management and Planning Authority (CAMPA) in 2004 to manage all monies from user agencies for CA, NPV, etc. The law establishes the National Compensatory Afforestation Fund under the Public Account of India, and a State Compensatory Afforestation Fund under the Public Account of each state. The National Fund will receive 10% of these funds, and the State Funds will receive the remaining 90%. A Compensatory Afforestation Fund (CAF) Act, 2016 was enacted by the center in 2016 and the related rules were notified in 2018.

2.1. Objective of CAMPA

CAMPA is meant to promote afforestation and forest regeneration activities as a way of compensating for forest land diverted for non-forest purposes. The broad objectives of CAMPA are as follows:

a. Conservation, protection, regeneration, and management of existing natural forests

b. Conservation, protection and management of wildlife and its habitat within and outside protected area, including the consolidation of the protected areas

c. Compensatory afforestation

d. Environmental services, which includes

- Provision of goods such as wood, non-timber forest products, fuel, fodder and water, and provision of services such as grazing, tourism, wildlife protection and life support.
- Regulating services such as climate regulation, disease control, flood moderation, detoxification, carbon sequestration and health of soils, air, and water regimes
- Non-material benefits obtained from ecosystems, spiritual, recreational, aesthetic, inspirational, educational, and symbolic; and
- Supporting such other services necessary to produce ecosystem services, biodiversity, nutrient cycling, and primary production.

e. Research, training, and capacity building including promotion of voluntary movement of youth and students for supporting conservation activities initiated/ongoing in the State Forest Department.

The CAFs transferred to States are in addition to State Budget and are used as per the provisions of CAF Act and Rules. With increased focused on achieving Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs), the MoEFCC expects states to utilize the CAMPA funds towards forestry activities that can help achieving objectives of NDC goal of creating

additional carbon sinks through increased forest and tree cover. In addition to this, the CAMPA funds can be used for treatment of catchment areas, assisted natural generation, forest management, wildlife protection and management, relocation of villages from protected areas, managing human-wildlife conflicts, training and awareness generation, establishment, up-gradation and maintenance of modern nurseries, establishment and upgradation of forest paths, construction of office buildings, supply of wood saving devices and allied forestry-related activities as mentioned in CAF Rules 2018.

2.2 Project Area

Assam, the second largest state in North Eastern India, is situated south of the Eastern Himalayas, along the Brahmaputra and Barak river valleys. The State lies between 24°07' N to 28°00' N latitude 89°42' E to 96°02 E longitude, with geographical area of 78,438 sq km, which is about 2.4% of the total geographical area of the country and it has a population of 31.21 million (Source: Census 2011). A land of enchanting aesthetic beauty with lush green hills, the State can be broadly divided into 3 physiographic domains, namely, Brahmaputra valley, Central Assam Hills (Mikir Hills in Karbi Anglong and North Cachar Hill districts) and Barak Valley, with international borders of Bhutan in North and Bangladesh in South.

As per the 2019 India State of Forest Report of FSI, the total forest cover of Assam is 28,327 sq. km., which is approximately 36.11% of the total geographical area of the state, whereas recorded forest area is 26,832 sq. km. The forest cover in the State has increased by 221.51 sq. km. as compared to previous assessment of 2017. The tree cover, which includes individual trees and patches less than 1 ha, has been found to be 1408 sq. km.

The State has subtropical climate and the annual rainfall ranges between 1,500 mm and 3,800 mm and the mean annual temperature varies from 5°C to 32°C. As per the Champion & Seth Classification of Forest Types (1968), the forests of Assam have been categorized into seven Forest Type Groups, namely, tropical wet evergreen forests, tropical semi-evergreen forests, tropical moist-deciduous forests, littoral and swamp forests, tropical dry deciduous forests, subtropical broadleaved hill forests, and subtropical pine forests.




FIGURE 2: BASE MAP SHOWING ADMINISTRATIVE DIVISIONS OF ASSAM

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The state of Assam has been divided into 5 administrative zones as Commissionaires, comprising 33 administrative civil districts. The map illustrated in **Figure 2** shows the five administrative zones of Assam, namely, the Upper Assam, Lower Assam, Central Assam & Hills, Northern Assam, and Barak Valley, which has been prepared using the data provided by the Environmental Systems Research Institute (ESRI) India.

3. Methodology: Project Approach and Implementation

3.1 Project Brief

The key objective of this project was to monitor and evaluate various activities that were maintained or created with the funds provided under the CAMPA scheme by the Assam Forest Department in the periods of 2017-18 and 2018-19. Although the Agreement for the project was signed on 20 February 2020, the deliverables for the project have been delayed because of the worldwide COVID-19 pandemic situation. The delay was kindly condoned by the Assam State CAMPA vide letter No.FG.27/CAMPA dated 03 July 2020 treating the delay as a force majeure. The Inception Report of the project was submitted on 20 July 2020, which was resubmitted on 25 August 2020 after incorporating few changes recommended by the Assam State CAMPA. The Inception Report was accepted by the CEO of Assam State CAMPA on 10 September 2020. The field work started after conducting orientation training on 22 September 2020 in Guwahati. Subsequently, the Interim Report of the project was submitted on 27 October 2020 to the Assam State CAMPA. The project team also delivered a PowerPoint presentation to the CEO, Assam State CAMPA which was attended by the PCCF & HOFF on 29 October 2020 after the Interim Report submission. The project team informed Assam State CAMPA about the various challenges and bottlenecks that project team faced during the evaluation work. The Assam State CAMPA provided clarifications on the matters discussed during the presentation and suggested project team to complete the field work as per the timelines. This is the final report that covers the broad methodology and approach followed by the project team for monitoring and evaluation (M&E) of the State CAMPA activities carried out in the periods of 2017-18 and 2018-19, along with the key findings, outcomes, and observations after assessment of the performances of the CAMPA activities at Division, Circle, and State levels. In addition to this, the project team also engaged professional drone operators and videographers to capture footage for CAMPA activities of 2017-18 and 2018-19.


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3.2. Project Scope

- The CAMPA activities under the Assam Forest Department were mainly classified into 4 major categories, namely, Nursery Management, Plantation Management, Infrastructures & Road Developments, and Other Works.
- Nursery Management constitutes of 'Maintenance of nurseries that were created in 2017-18 or in the previous years' and 'Creation of new nurseries in both years of 2017-18 and 2018-19'.
- Plantation Management constitutes of 'Maintenance of plantations that were created in 2017-18 or the previous years' and 'Creation of new plantations in both years of 2017-18 and 2018-19'. In all, 5 types of plantations were found, namely, Site-Specific Plantations (SSP), ANR, Afforestation, Sal Coppice, and Apurugiya.
- Infrastructures & Road Development comprised Anti-poaching Camps (APCs), Assam Type Barracks (ATBs), Forest Force Camps (FFCs), Forest Guard Quarters (FGQs), Forester Quarters (FQs), Range Officer Quarter (ROQs), Watch Towers (WTs), and roads & Elephant Proof Trenches (EPTs) constructed in years 2017 and 2018.
- Other Works included works of Training and Capacity Developments (TCD)&Staff Amenities (SAs) done in years 2017 and 2018.

3.3 Project Implementation

The Project implementation took place in six main stages, as illustrated and explained below:



Stage 1: Data Collection and Meeting

The GIPL project team collected data for the CAMPA-funded activities that were maintained or created in the periods of 2017-18 and 2018-19 from Assam State CAMPA office of the Assam Forest Department. The project team then reviewed and compiled the data collected, and later sought clarifications on relevant queries that came up during the review process. In addition to this, a meeting was organized before the commencement of the project between the GIPL project team, which was led by Project Lead, Dr. Devendra Pandey (Retired IFS officer), and the Assam State CAMPA CEO Dr. Satyendra Singh, in the presence of GIPL CEO, Dr. Jagdish Kishwan, on **27 June 2020** to understand the project scope, timelines and challenges in view of COVID-19-related travel restrictions and lockdowns in State of Assam.

During the meeting, it was decided that GPS locations of all the CAMPA activities under the scope of monitoring and evaluation work will be collected by GIPL field team during the onsite visit and will be later cross verified with the GPS location data provided from the Assam State CAMPA in order to determine all the exact locations under the CAMPA scheme.

Stage 2: Development of Key Performance Indicators and Scoring Pattern

The monitoring and evaluation work of CAMPA activities was carried out by using suitable performance indicators (qualitative or quantitative) developed for each category of CAMPA activity i.e., Plantations, Nursery, Infrastructure and Other works, taken up for assessment in order to effectively meet the aim and objective of the project. The performance indicators were developed in such a way that it also addressed environmental as well as socio-economic impacts of State CAMPA activities. The performance indicators selected for the various CAMPA activities are mentioned in **Table 1**.

All the performance indicators developed for each category of CAMPA activity were listed in a Checklist template (Annexure 1), which was used by the field evaluators during the onsite field visit to score the performance indicators on the basis of implementation, completion, and quality of the CAMPA activity. Each performance indicator in the Checklist, specific to the category of CAMPA activity, was measured on a scale of 0-10. In addition, various sub-criteria were listed under each performance indicator in the Checklist. On the basis of the relative importance of each criterion, the total score 10 allotted to a performance indicator was distributed to each criterion under that. The average score of all the performance indicators was determined as the final score for the particular activity assessed. Similarly, the overall score of a particular Forest Division was determined by taking an average score of all activities and sites visited and evaluated in the Forest Division. The scores provided to different CAMPA activities assessed at the Forest Division level, also known as Program Implementation Unit (PIU), was then used to prepare a cumulative score matrix for each category of CAMPA activity, which included all the sampled and visited forest divisions of the State. The cumulative score matrix also determined the performance of CAMPA activities at Circle and State levels, the list of which is provided in Table 2.

SCORING PATTERN

The field team evaluated the performance and execution work of the CAMPA activities against each performance indicator and sub-criteria in the Checklist and also assessed conformance with the State CAMPA norms and orders. On the basis of which, the scoring was done on a scale from 0 to 10 (0 indicating least compliance and 10 being the highest compliance score). The evaluation done by the field team was based on the objective evidence collected, onsite work execution, work quality, interview with the forest staff,

document review and onsite field verification of CAMPA activities. The final score of a particular activity was determined by calculating the average of the scores provided to all performance indicators under that activity.

Stage 3: Selection of PIUs/Forest Divisions and Preparation for Field Work

For an efficient coverage of the entire project area, the project team prepared a detailed field plan in consultation with Assam State CAMPA to carry out physical inspection in different Forest Divisions of Assam. Four field teams, namely Team A, Team B, Team C, and Team D, were constituted to carry out the field visits, spreading over different administrative zones (Northern and Upper Assam, Lower Assam, in and around Guwahati and Central Assam and Barak Valley). All the teams efficiently conducted the assessment, on average 12-14 Forest Divisions in stipulated time. GPS locations of all the sites visited by the teams were recorded the checklists. Subsequently, few Forest Divisions were selected on random basis for recording drone videography.

A. Selection of PIUs/Forest Divisions

On the basis of the data provided by Assam State CAMPA office, the CAMPA-funded activities were carried out in a total of *56 Forest Divisions* distributed in *11 Circles* and *1 Training Institute* in the state. The details are mentioned in **Table 3**.

B. Selection of sites for the field visit as per the Terms of Reference (ToR)

To evaluate various CAMPA activities and progress, performance and impacts of the schemes initiated by Assam State CAMPA in different Forest Divisions, following approach for site selection process was adopted (**Table 4**).

On perusal of data, it was found that **nursery activities**, including both maintenance and creation, were carried out in a total of **47** Forest Divisions distributed in **11** circles. **Maintenance of plantations** was observed in **31** Forest divisions distributed in **10** Circles and Creation of plantations was observed in **29** Forest divisions distributed in **9** Circles. Activities of Infrastructure & Road Development were observed in **23** Forest divisions distributed in 8 Circles for **2017-18** and **20** Forest divisions distributed in 8 Circles and the Research & Education Circle for **2018-19**. In addition, activities for **Other Works** were observed in a total of **22** Forest divisions distributed in **7** Circles and the Research & Education Circle for 2017-18 and 2018-19.

Based on the above data, the project team carried out planning to undertake M&E assessment in **49 PIUs (48 Forest divisions and 1 Training Institute)** on the basis of

sampling. The GPS coordinates for the sites and activity details were verified onsite and tallied with the data provided by the Assam State CAMPA.

C. Use of GPS

The GPS coordinates of all the visited sites during the Monitoring & Evaluation work were recorded in the field checklists and tallied with the GPS co-ordinates received from the Assam State CAMPA. This was done to ensure accurate verification of the physical location of the CAMPA activities that were being visited by the field team. To ensure smooth and efficient execution of the task, our field evaluators were trained to use GPS devices by Project Lead, Dr. Devendra Pandey and Project Associate, Mr. Sidharth Borah before onset of field work. A hands-on training was provided to field evaluators, by taking them to the field and practical use was demonstrated during onsite field visit to in & around Guwahati area.

D. Project Planning and Field work

The field visits for CAMPA M&E activities undertaken for the period of 2017-18 and 2018-19 were carried out by the four teams as mentioned earlier throughout the selected 48 Forest divisions and 1 Training Institute (after sampling of 56 forest divisions and 1 Training Institute) in different districts of Assam. The regional office of GICIA India Private Limited (GIPL) located at Guwahati was involved in the day-to-day planning, execution, and monitoring of activities. For efficient execution of Monitoring and Evaluation, GIPL deployed a core team of experienced resources, which was led by Former Director General, FSI & PCCF (HoFF), Arunachal Pradesh, and a renowned statistician Dr. Devendra Pandey, to manage and monitor the project activities involved in the Monitoring and Evaluation work of CAMPA activities in Assam. The focal point of contact for Dr. Devendra Pandey and all team members was Ms. Taruna Singh, Project Manager, and Mr. Ishaan Chahal, Project Officer. The coordination work in Guwahati Office, Assam, with the support of Head Office, was undertaken by Ms. Poree Buragohain, Senior Program Officer, and Mr. Sidharth Borah, Project Officer. In addition to this, it was planned to hire three retired Range Forest Officers (RFOs) and three PhD scholars with good field experience to carry out the field work and evaluation activities with support of core team.

However, due to ongoing health risks and travel restrictions, only two RFOs and two PhD scholars were engaged for the field work.

The various CAMPA activities under the selected Forest Divisions were distributed among the four teams (Teams A, B, C, and D) to carry out the Monitoring and Evaluation work, as shown in **Table 5**. Each team had two field evaluators, one Retired RFO and one PhD scholar, except for Team A, which comprised one Senior Program Officer and one Project Officer of GIPL. Team A was assigned to carry out the field visits in Forest divisions located in & around Guwahati, whereas Teams B, C, and Were assigned to carry out field activities in Forest divisions located in Central Assam & Barak Valley, Lower Assam, and Upper & Northern Assam zones, respectively.




FIGURE 3. TEAM COMPOSITION FOR CAMPA M&E 2017-18 AND 2018-19

In addition to this, technical services from GIPL office, Noida and support services of Mr. Prandip Nath from GIPL office, Guwahati, were used from time to time. The detailed composition of Project team members has been shown in **Figure 3**.

E. Training of Survey Team

A one-day training session was organized for all the field evaluators, along with other members of the project on 22 September 2020 in Guwahati. The training was organized at GIPL, Guwahati Office, where all the field evaluators were present. Project Lead, Dr. Devendra Pandey and Project Manager, Ms. Taruna Singh were the resource persons who explained and guided in online mode. The field evaluators were explained thoroughly each indicator of the checklist and subsequent verification of each indicator and giving scoring based on the performance of the site. Classroom training was followed by field visits in divisions located in & around Guwahati where the field evaluators were given a practical exposure to the evaluation methodology. During field evaluation, each team was using a GPS device to take coordinates of all the sites that were visited for monitoring and evaluation of CAMPA activities. These coordinates were then verified against the data of GPS co-ordinates that had been provided by the Assam State CAMPA to ensure accurate verification of the location. For this, a small practical hands-on training was provided to the field evaluators by Mr. Sidharth Borah, Project Associate, at Guwahati office for proper use of GPS in the field at the time of classroom training session. Following topics were covered as part of the agenda of the training:

- Introduction to CAMPA, Project briefing, Aim & Objectives, etc.
- Evaluation Methodology
- Introduction to GPS handling
- Hands-on training for GPS handling
- Briefing on general guidelines to be followed during field visits, code of conduct, Do's & Don'ts, etc. especially in view of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Stage 4: Delegating of Forest Divisions to Field Team

After consultation with Assam State CAMPA and keeping in mind travel constraints and health related risks due to COVID-19 pandemic and monsoon season, a field visit plan was chalked out (Annexure 2). Each team was allocated forest divisions zone wise to carry out the field visits. All the selected 49 PIUs (48 Forest Divisions and 1 Training Institute)

were allocated to the four teams and all the activities of that division were covered by the team. A list of Forest Divisions visited by different teams is mentioned in **Table 5**.

Note: The Forest Divisions were allocated to survey teams based on the travel itinerary, distance between Forest divisions and field plan. For example, Nagaon South Division, Hojai was covered by Team B (Central Assam & Hills and Barak Valley Zone) rather than Team D, covering upper and northern Assam zone, as it was on route to divisions to be covered by Team B. Similarly, Silchar S.F. and Karimganj S.F. were covered by Team B (Central Assam Zone). The Upper Assam and the Northern Assam divisions were combined as all the divisions were on the same travel route during the field assessment.

Stage 5: Drone Videography

As per the ToR of the CAMPA monitoring and evaluation, drone videography of selected Forest divisions of the Assam was carried out. The project team engaged two drone videographers who completed the aerial videography in all the four project zones, (i) Upper & Northern Assam, (ii) Lower Assam, (iii) In & around Guwahati and (iv) Central Assam & Hills and Barak Valley. Please refer section 4.7 for more information.

Stage 6: Data Compilation & Analysis

Data and information gathered by the field evaluators in the checklists were compiled in the form of an excel sheet. Simple average technique was implemented in calculating the overall scores, at divisional, state, and activity levels. In terms of activities, overall scores of nursery management, infrastructures & other works were generated using the simple average algorithm. However, in terms of plantation maintenance as well as new creation, weighted average technique was adopted. The team has used charts/graphs to depict the results of data analysis for each CAMPA activity.

3.4 Evaluation Criteria

A. <u>Nursery Management</u>

The main performance indicators developed to evaluate under Nursery Management, along with and their assessing techniques, were as follows:

- **Survival percent**: Survival per cent was assessed based on the number of surviving plants in the poly bags divided by no of poly bags in randomly selected beds
- Health of plants: Health of the plants was assessed based on the physical attributes like growth, height, and number of leaves per plant, spacing between the saplings, rooting stretching outside the poly bag, pest, and pathogenic attack
- Maintenance: Drainage/watering system, Protection mechanism-Greenhouse/Sheds etc., status of weeding, Maintenance of the paths & roads within the nursery, use of organic manure and fertilizers and Nature of containers/pots were the attributes to assess the maintenance of the nursery
- Sustainability: Production of seedlings as per stated norms & guidelines and percentage of seedling planted on-site or distributed to the public as per norms/guidelines in addition to remaining stock of seedling in the nursery were the attributes to assess the sustainability
- Package of practices: Compliance with the CAMPA guidelines & norms as directed by the Assam State CAMPA, Sourcing of planting material (wild seedling, plus tree, soil media composition, application of fertilisers and pesticides as per the norms, transportation of seedlings as per the norms)
- **Physical target/ achievement**: Verified the documents and the norms
- Financial target/ achievement: Based on the utilization certificate and sanction letters
- Stock utilization: Is based on the nursery stock register and distribution register
- Damage of saplings: Based on the entries in plantation journal or any other register/ documents produced to the DFO with respect to the damage
- **Training and capacity building of nursery staff**: Interaction with nursery staff to judge their level of knowledge, No. of Training / workshop on capacity building based on the availability of Training records/documents

- Record keeping (list of records verified under the section): Overall record keeping activity, Safe storage and efficient management of the records, Following Guidelines issued from Assam Forest department & HOFF Office
- Protection mechanism: Maintenance of boundary and fencing of nursery, Status of watch and ward round the clock, Measures taken to protect against wild/other animals were the main indicators

B. Plantation Management

The main performance indicators developed to assess Plantation Management were as follows:

- **Criteria for selection of site**: Based on the CAMPA objectives like land converted for infrastructural building, irrigational projects, or evacuation of *Jhum cultivation*, which was verified by the documents or interacting with front line staff of forest department
- **Criteria for choice of species:** Species suitability to the site conditions, selection of indigenous species/ suitability to the local people, able to withstand severe competition with weeds and environmental distress, should be possibly fast growing and high yielding were the indicators
- Site suitability: Compliance of the type of plantation with the management plan/guidelines/norm of the State CAMPA, and soil, moisture and climate conditions of the site to support the growth of species, were the indicators
- Field preparation: Verification of the plantation site with GPS, field preparation activities, like advance works, preparation of land by digging and soil work, removal of weeds and if required controlled slash burning, mainly through plantation journal and other records. Verification of construction works for soil moisture conservation, spacing and demarcating of pits especially in case of new plantations, physically and with documents
- Cultural operation: All tending operations were verified with plantation register period during which they were undertaken and completed were verified in the field
- **Gap planting:** Verified with plantation journal and field verification about the percentage of gap planting

- Survival rate: Number of plants survived per row divided by number of plants to be existed based on pit count in random rows. This is in case of SSP and Apurugiya. No of plants/trees survived in quadrates laid in case of ANR and Sal coppice. Verified the number of saplings planted based on the norms
- Time of planting of saplings: Verified based on local norms and local practises keeping in mind the climate and Verified based on records like plantation journal and register
- Protection mechanism: Condition of fencing around the plantation as per plan, availability of maintained camp huts for watchers, biotic interferences during the time of evaluation like grazing, illegal felling, encroachment or for Jhum cultivation
- **SMC activities:** Drainage line treatment, verification through plantation journal or MB book and verifying in field as per the norms, erosion-control measures, maintenance of water tanks or streams, if any, within the plantation site
- Illegal activities: Interviewed the field staff about level to biotic interference in plantation area, physically observations, the marks of illegal activity including encroachment in the site, Availability of watch guards
- Record Keeping: Safe storage and maintenance of the official records, time-totime updating of records, verification of records & documents at Divisional level, Range level and plantation level
- **Training and capacity building of plantation staff and workers:** Interaction with nursery staff to judge their level of knowledge, number of training/workshop(s) on capacity building based on the availability of training records/documents

C. Infrastructure & Road Development

The key performance indicators developed to carry out assessment under Infrastructures& Road Developments were as follows.

- Plan Estimate and approval: Assessed based on the sanction/approval orders
- Testing of soil, building material: Assessed based on the records
- Physical target/ achievement: Based on the verification of the records maintained, physical measurement of the building & road dimensions and tallying with the plan and design

• **Financial target/ achievement**: Based on the verification of the sanction letter and utilization certificate

D. Other Works

The key performance indicators that were used to assess the completion and effectiveness of works such as TCDs and SAs were as follows:

- Level of trainings: Assessed based on records & official documents
- **Objectives of trainings:** Assessed based on the records & official documents
- **Outcomes:** Assessed based on the level of knowledge of the staff, judgement based on interview, Assessment based on the records & official documents like training records, pictures, Minutes of the meeting records, etc.
- Financial target/achievement: Assessed based on the verification of the sanction letter and expenditure booked

3.5 Analysis of Scores

The scores for all CAMPA activities evaluated were compiled in a master score matrix for easy analysis and representation. While analyzing the scores, to draw the findings about performance of CAMPA activities, activities under all the four main categories, namely Nursery Management, Plantation Management, Infrastructures & Road Development, and Other works were given equal weightage for convenience and ease of analysis. Under Nursery Management, both type of nurseries, that is 1.5 ha and 3 ha nurseries, were considered for evaluation. Under Plantation, scores of all the five types of plantations, namely SSP, Afforestation, Sal Coppice, ANR, and Apurugiya were taken into consideration. Under Infrastructure category, buildings such as APCs, ATBs, FFCs, FGQs, FQs, RFOQs, and WTs, and improvement and maintenance of roads and EPTs were considered were evaluation work. Lastly, under Other Works, works of TCDs and SAs were included for the evaluation purposes.

3.5.1 Computing Score for Sampled Sites and CAMPA Activities

The field team used the checklist prepared for each category of CAMPA activity to evaluate and score the CAMPA activities against the pre-defined performance indicators.

The total score for one CAMPA activity or site was computed as average of scores assigned to individual performance indicators. The field team verified and collected relevant records and documents as evidence to support and justify the score allotted.

3.5.2 Computation of Divisional Performance Score for Various Activities

The scores of individual categories of activities were used to compute the performance score for the various activities (Plantation creation, Plantation maintenance, Nursery, Infrastructure, Other works) at the Forest Division level. For example, for computing total score of Infrastructure activities in a Forest Division, team calculated an average score of all Infrastructure activities in the forest division using the formula:

Avg = (Sum of Score of individual Infrastructure activity in a division)/Total number of infrastructure activities in a Forest Division).

However, in the case of plantations (both maintenance and creation), weighted average method was used as explained in table below:

3.5.3 Computation of Performance Score for Various Activities at State/Circle Level

Performance score for an activity at State/Circle level was computed from Divisional performance score in respect of that activity in the State/Circle computed by simple average method as explained in the above section.

In respect of plantations, where varying areas have been taken up in different Divisions, weighted average method was used [Score at State/Circle level = Sum (Ai*Si) / Sum (Ai), where Ai is the plantation area in a division and Si is the performance score of plantation activity in that Division].

3.5.4 Computation of Overall Performance Score of Division

The overall performance score of a Division under CAMPA was computed as simple average of the performance of various activities taken up in that Division.

3.5.5 Computation of Overall Performance Score at State/Circle Level

The overall performance score under CAMPA at State/Circle level was computed as simple average of the performance scores of activities taken up in all the divisions in the State.

4. Findings & Discussion

4.1 Abstract of Assessment Coverage Vis-à-Vis ToR

Complying with the guidelines mentioned in the ToR, no deviation has been observed in terms of sampling of Nurseries, Plantations, and Other Works, whereas a slight deviation was found in infrastructures under Infrastructures & Road Developments in the coverage of field activities by field evaluators. The details of assessment coverage of CAMPA activities as per ToR have been mentioned in **Table 6**. In all, **52.94% of 1.5 ha nurseries** and **55.17 % of 3 ha nurseries/3 ha nursery cum resource center** was evaluated under the category of Nursery Management, including nurseries under maintained and created category in the periods of 2017-18 and 2018-19.

Under the category Plantation Management, including maintained and created plantations, 69.44% of SSP, 83.67% of Afforestation, 100% of ANR, 71.42% of Sal coppice, and 100% of Apurugiya plantations were evaluated onsite.

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In addition, **98.65% of infrastructure buildings** and **100% of roads & EPTs**, which included constructions in both the periods of 2017-18 and 2018-19, were visited and evaluated under the category of Infrastructures & Road Development. For Other Works category, **64.70% of TCDs** and **44.44% of SAs** were assessed. In totality, **54.57%** of total 'other works' have been assessed & evaluated.

4.2 Assessment Coverage of Sampled Sites



4.2.1 Nursery Management:

The nurseries included for evaluation under Assam State CAMPA were of two types based on their area, that is, 1.5 ha and 3 ha. A total of **68 nurseries of 1.5 ha area** and **29 nurseries of 3 ha area/3 ha area nursery cum resource center**, including both creation and maintenance, were found for evaluation as per the data provided to us. Of which, **36 (52.94%) and 16 nurseries (55.17%) under 1.5 and 3 ha/3 ha nursery cum resource**



center category, respectively, were visited and evaluated by the field evaluators, as represented in **Figure 4**.

It is to be noted that as per the data provided by Assam State CAMPA, **out of the 68 nurseries of 1.5 ha area**, **47 were continued and 21 were abandoned/discontinued nurseries** because of non-availability of funds. Similarly, out of the total **29 nurseries of 3 ha area**, **22 were continued and 7 were abandoned/discontinued nurseries** because of non-availability of funds. The reason of non-availability of funds was intimated by the Assam SFD to the project team after submission of Interim report (**Annexure 3**). Overall, **28 nurseries**, including both 1.5 ha and 3 ha nurseries were found to be abandoned/discontinued, of which 2 were abandoned/discontinued in 2018-19 and the remaining were abandoned/discontinued in 2019-20.

As per the ToR, the project team was supposed to sample at least 50% of each type of nursery i.e., 3 ha and 1.5 ha nurseries. Hence, the project team sampled and selected 36 nurseries of 1.5 ha areas and 29 nurseries of 3 ha area for M&E work. Out of the 36

nurseries of 1.5 ha area that were assessed by field evaluators, **30 were continued and 6 were abandoned/discontinued nurseries**. Similarly, out of the **16** nurseries of 3 ha area that were assessed by field evaluators, **13 were continued and 3 were abandoned/discontinued nurseries**. The list of discontinued nurseries that were assessed by field evaluators has been mentioned in **Table 8**.

4.2.2 Plantation Management:




FIGURE 5. PLANTATION COVERAGE

As per sampling, ≥50% of each type of plantations (that is, SSP, Afforestation, ANR, Sal Coppice, and Apurugiya) in all Forest divisions were covered. And at least 50% or more patches under each sampled plantation type was covered. A **total of 36 SSP, 49 Afforestation, 7 ANR, 14 Sal Coppice, and 8 Apurugiya plantation sites**, including both maintenance and creation plantations of 2017-18 and 2018-19 periods, were found for evaluation as per the data provided by Assam State CAMPA. Of which, **25 SSP** (69.44%), **41 Afforestation** (83.67%), **7 ANR** (100%), **10 Sal Coppice** (71.42%), **and 8 Apurugiya** (100%) **plantation sites** were covered by field evaluators during field visit. The graphical representation of the total and assessed plantation sites has been shown in **Figure 5**.

Overall, the total areas under plantation schemes, namely SSP, Afforestation, Sal Coppice, ANR, and Apurugiya plantations, including both maintenance and creation plantations in the periods of 2017-18 and 2018-19, were found to be 2789.36 ha, 1971.5ha, 825 ha, 300 ha, and 40 ha, respectively. Of which, 1446.51 ha SSP, 1471.5 ha Afforestation, 408 ha Sal Coppice, 300 ha ANR, and 40 ha Apurugiya plantations were visited and evaluated by the field team. The complete details of area coverage of plantations have been mentioned in Table 9.

1) Maintenance:

A total area of 2416.67 ha SSP plantations were found to be maintained in both the periods of 2017-18 and 2018-19, including 2132.69 ha in 2017-18 and 1429.25 ha in 2018-19, respectively. Of which, a total of 1118.08 ha area of SSP plantations was evaluated by the project team. Areas of 776.5 ha and 1312 ha of Afforestation plantations were found to be maintained 2017-18 and 2018-19 periods, respectively.

However, only **46.5** ha area of above-mentioned Afforestation plantations was maintained, which was found to be created in the previous monitoring & evaluation period. Of which, **46.5** ha area has been assessed by the project team. Similarly, areas of **225** ha and **500** ha of Sal Coppice plantations were found to be maintained in 2017-18 and 2018-19 periods, respectively, but only **25** ha area of above-mentioned Sal coppice plantations was maintained, which was found to be created in the previous monitoring & evaluation period. In addition, areas of **50** ha and **250** ha under ANR plantations were found to be maintained in 2017-18 and 2018-19 periods, respectively, and area of **5** ha area of **5** ha under ANR plantations were found to be maintained in 2017-18 and 2018-19 periods, respectively, and area of **5** ha

2) Creation:

An area of 372.69 ha SSP plantations was found to be created in the period of 2018-19 only. Of which, 328.43 ha area of SSP plantations was evaluated. Similarly, total areas of 1925 ha Afforestation, 800 ha Sal Coppice, 300 ha ANR, and 40 ha Apurugiya plantations were found to be created, including both the periods of 2017-18 and 2018-19. Areas of 1010 ha and 915 ha under Afforestation plantations, 475 ha and 325 ha under Sal Coppice plantations, 50 ha and 250 ha under ANR plantations, 20 ha and 20 ha under Apurugiya plantations were found to be created in 2017-18 and 2018-19 periods, respectively. In all, 1425 ha Afforestation, 408 ha Sal Coppice, 300 ha ANR, and 40 ha Apurugiya plantations were covered and assessed.

As per the data provided by Assam State CAMPA, funds for only **advance work** was released for a total of **140 ha area under Afforestation plantations** in the period of 2017-18, which was created in the period of 2018-19, whereas fund for both **advance work and creation** for **25 ha area under Afforestation plantations** was released in the period of 2018-19. Similarly, funds for only **advance work** was released for a total of **275 ha area under ANR plantations** in the period of 2017-18, which was created in the period of 2018-19, whereas fund for both **advance work and creation** for **25 ha area under ANR plantations** in the period of 2017-18, which was created in the period of 2018-19, whereas fund for both **advance work and creation** for **25 ha area under ANR plantations** was released in the period of 2018-19. On the other hand, funds for only **advance work** was released for a total of **375 ha area under Sal Coppice plantations** in the period of 2017-18, which was created in the period of 2017-18, which was created in the period of 2018-19, but fund for both

advance work and creation for 50 ha area under Sal Coppice plantations was released in the period of 2017-18. In addition, funds for only advance work was released for 50 ha area under ANR plantations and 50 ha area under Sal Coppice plantations in the period of 2017-18. However, it was informed that funds for creation of these plantations were released in the period of 2018-19. Of which, 50 ha area under ANR plantations and 25 ha area under Sal Coppice plantations were evaluated by the project team.

4.2.3 Infrastructures & Road Development:




FIGURE 6. INFRASTRUCTURE COVERAGE

In all, **18** APCs (13 in 2017-18 and 5 in 2018-19), **18** ATBs (10 in 2017-18 and 8 in 2018-19), **2** FFCs (both in 2017-18), **16** FGQs (11 in 2017-18 and 5 in 2018-19), **15** FQs (10 in 2017-18 and 5 in 2018-19), **2** ROQs (both in 2018-19), **and 3** WTs (all 3 in 2018-19) under Infrastructures were found in the data provided for monitoring and evaluation. All these infrastructures were visited and evaluated, except for only 1 ATB in Digboi division. In addition, **85.5** km under Forest roads (52 km in 2017-18 and 33.5 in 2018-19) and **35** km under EPTs (in 2017-18 only) were provided for the evaluation. All the stretches of Forest roads and EPTs were assessed and evaluated. The graphical representations of the coverage details for Infrastructures and Roads & EPTs have been showed in Figures 6 and **7**, respectively. One FGQ in Jorhat division was excluded from assessment after confirmation with Assam State CAMPA (Annexure4).




FIGURE 7. ROADS AND EPT COVERAGE

4.2.4 Other Works:

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


FIGURE 8. OTHER WORKS COVERAGE

A total of **17 TCDs** and **9 SAs** were found for evaluation. Of which, **11 TCDs** (64.70%) and **4 SAs** (44.44%) were evaluated, as represented in **Figure 8**.

4.3 Assessment at State Level

The overall performance score of the State was computed to be **8.09**. The overall performance score under Nursery Management was computed to be **7.84**. Similarly, overall scores under Plantation, Infrastructure & Road Development, and Other Works were computed to be **8.12**, **8.65**, and **9.26**, respectively. The cumulative score matrix has been computed and detailed below in **Table 10**.

4.4 Circle-wise Assessment Score of Forest Divisions




FIGURE 9. ACTIVITY-WISE SCORE OF CAC GUWAHATI

All **11 Forest Circles** and **1 Research & Education Circle** were involved in the implementation of CAMPA activities in the State. Performances of these Circles under CAMPA were based on the individual performance scores of the constituent Forest divisions for the various activities undertaken in the respective divisions. The overall performance scores of the constituent divisions under each Circle have been depicted in

following sections and **Figures 9-19** (**Note:** The blank spaces in the tables of Figures 7-18 depict absence of the particular activity under that given Division):

1. CAC Guwahati:

The performance scores of the Forest Divisions under CAC, Guwahati Circle has been represented in **Figure 9**. Under CAC, Guwahati, overall scores of Goalpara, Kamrup East, Kamrup West, and North Kamrup Forest Divisions were calculated to be 8.16, 7.91, 7.19 and 5.75, respectively. Goalpara and Kamrup West divisions have carried out works under 3 categories of activities, namely, Nursery Management, Plantation Management, and Infrastructures & Road Development. However, Kamrup East division had works under all the four categories, that is, Nursery Management, Plantation Management, Infrastructures & Road Development, and Other Works. Only one activity under Infrastructures& Road Development category was implemented in North Kamrup.

2. CSASFC Guwahati:




FIGURE 10. ACTIVITY-WISE SCORE OF CSAFC GUWAHATI

The performance scores of the Forest Divisions under CSASFC, Guwahati circle have been showed in **Figure 10**. Under CSASFC, Guwahati, Karimganj SF division secured the highest score of 8.68 (with 3, followed by Silchar SF division with an overall of 7.20 and Guwahati SF division with an overall score of 6.33. However, it is to be noted that works under Nursery Management and Plantation Management categories only were taken up in Silchar SF division, whereas only works under Plantation Management and Infrastructures & Road Development categories were done in Karimganj SF division. Only one activity under Nursery Management was carried out in Guwahati SF division.

3. PCCF Wildlife:





FIGURE 11. ACTIVITY-WISE SCORE OF PCCF WILDLIFE

The performance scores of the Forest divisions under PCCF, Wildlife circle has been represented in **Figure 11**. Under PCCF, Wildlife, Nagaon Wildlife division obtained the highest score of 9.75, followed by Manas National Park division with 9.34, Assam State Zoo with 9.30, Guwahati Wildlife division with 9.13, Kaziranga National Park division with 9.11, Chakrasila Wildlife Sanctuary with 8, and Tinsukia Wildlife division with 6. Out of

these 7 Forest divisions, 6 divisions, namely, Kaziranga National Park, Chakrasila Wildlife Sanctuary, Manas National Park, Nagaon Wildlife, Tinsukia Wildlife, and Guwahati Wildlife took up activities under Infrastructure & Road Development category only. However, Assam State Zoo carried out works under Infrastructure & Road Development Other Works categories (only TCD).

4. EAC Jorhat

The performance scores of the Forest divisions under EAC, Jorhat circle, have been depicted in **Figure 12**. Under EAC, Jorhat circle, overall scores secured by Doomdooma, Dibrugarh, Digboi, Sivasagar, Jorhat, and Golaghat divisions were calculated to be 8.57, 7.83, 8.30, 8.40, 9.04, and 8.15, respectively. However, it is to be noted that only in Jorhat division, works under all the four categories of activities were carried out, whereas

works under three categories of activities were carried out in rest 3 Forest Divisions. i.e., Doomdooma, Digboi, and Golaghat divisions. Works under only two categories were carried out in Dibrugarh and Sivasagar divisions.





5. NAC Tezpur




FIGURE 13. ACTIVITY-WISE SCORE OF NAC TEZPUR

The performance scores of the constituent Forest Divisions under NAC, Tezpur circle have been showed in **Figure13**. Nagaon, Nagaon South (Hojai), Dhemaji, and Sonitpur East secured overall scores of 9.31, 8.67, 7.67 and 9.58, respectively, and all the four categories were found in these divisions. Lakhimpur and Sonitpur West divisions secured overall scores of 9.23 and 8.66, respectively, in which works under only two categories were carried out.

6. UASFC Nagaon




FIGURE 14. ACTIVITY-WISE SCORE OF UASFC NAGAON

The performance scores of the constituent divisions under UASFC, Nagaon circle, have been represented in **Figure 14**. Lakhimpur SF division, in which all four categories were found, secured an overall score of 9.16. Golaghat SF and Nagaon SF divisions, in which works under 3 categories were carried out, secured overall scores of 8.05 and 9.07, respectively. Sivasagar SF division secured an overall score of 8.57, in which two categories were found.

7. LASFC Bongaigaon




FIGURE 15. ACTIVITY-WISE SCORE OF LASFC, BONGAIGAON

The performance scores of the constituent Forest divisions under LASFC, Bongaigaon circle have been showed in **Figure 15**. Goalpara SF and AIE Valley divisions, in which all four categories were observed, secured overall scores of 9.02 and 8.89, respectively. Dhubri and Bongaigaon SF divisions, secured overall scores of 8.16 and 9.09, respectively, and works under three categories were carried out.

8. BTC Kokrajhar




FIGURE 16. ACTIVITY-WISE SCORE OF BTC KOKRAJHAR

BTC Kokrajhar performance scores have been represented in **Figure 16**. Baksa, Dhansiri, Haltugaon, and Kachugaon divisions got overall scores of 7.80, 8.14, 5.86, and 7.43, respectively, and works under three categories were found in these divisions. Kokrajhar SF division had only two categories and achieved a score of 9.17. Only Parbatjhora division had worked in all the four categories and it achieved an overall score of 9.35.

9. SAC Silchar




FIGURE 17 ACTIVITY-WISE SCORE OF SAC SILCHAR

SAC Silchar performance scores have been showed in **Figure 17**. Overall scores of 7.39 and 8.14, respectively, were calculated for Hailakandi and Cachar divisions, in which works under three categories were carried out. Karimganj division had worked under two categories only and secured an overall score of 8.46.

10. KAAC Diphu




FIGURE 18. ACTIVITY-WISE SCORE OF KAAC DIPHU

KAAC Diphu performance scores have been depicted in **Figure 18**. Hamren division, which had two categories of CAMPA activities, secured an overall score of 7.16 and Northern Afforestation, with work under only one category, secured an overall score of 6.66.

11. DHAC, Haflong




FIGURE 19. ACTIVITY-WISE SCORE OF DHAC HAFLONG

DHAC Haflong performance scores have been represented in **Figure 19**. Southern Afforestation division, in which works under three categories were carried out, got an overall score of 8.80. Only one category was found in Dima Hasao East and Dima Hasao West divisions, and these divisions got overall scores of 9.75 and 8.75, respectively.

12. Research & Education:




FIGURE 20.ACTIVITY-WISE SCORE OF RESEARCH AND EDUCATION CIRCLE

The performance score of the activities carried out by the institute under Research & Education and also the overall score obtained by the institute have been showed in **Figure 20**. The Assam Forest School located at Jalukbari, Guwahati, which falls under Research & Education, secured an overall score of 7.18, and it worked under the categories of Infrastructure & Road Development and Other Works only.

4.5 Summary of Scores at Division Level

The **Table 11** below summarizes the scores obtained by individual Forest divisions under the four broad categories of **Nursery Management**, **Plantation Management**, **Infrastructures & Road Developments, and Other works** throughout the State. Further, these Forest divisions were classified into four groups, as follows:

- Group A: Divisions having CAMPA works under all the four categories.
- Group B: Divisions having CAMPA works under three categories.
- Group C: Divisions having CAMPA works under two categories.
- Group D: Divisions having CAMPA works only under one category.

4.7 Drone Coverage

On the basis of the filled Checklists and inputs received from the field evaluators after the completion of monitoring and evaluation process, Forest divisions were selected on random basis for drone videography coverage in all the zones and subsequently sites were randomly selected in the selected divisions. Aerial videography was done only for two categories of CAMPA activities, that is, nurseries and plantations, which were

assessed by the field teams. The list of Forest divisions selected for drone videography has been mentioned in **Table 12**. In order to complete the drone videography coverage in stipulated time, two drone professionals located in two different places, one in Guwahati and other in Silchar, were engaged. Two teams were formed to conduct the field visits in different zones for drone videography. Each team consisted of two field evaluators and one drone professional. One team was assigned to cover Forest divisions located in the Central Assam &Barak Valley zone and the other team was assigned to cover Forest divisions located in & around Guwahati, Lower Assam, Upper Assam, and Northern Assam. Both the teams carried out drone videography in their respective zones and the footage covered by both the teams was compiled and edited to prepare a comprehensive footage of around 12-15 minutes, which is being submitted to the Assam Forest Department with the Final Report.




FIGURE 22. MAP FOR ASSESSED NURSERIES




FIGURE 23. MAP FOR ASSESSED PLANTATIONS (MAINTENANCE)




FIGURE 24. MAP FOR ASSESSED PLANTATIONS (CREATION)




FIGURE 25. MAP FOR ASSESSED INFRASTRUCTURES & ROAD DEVELOPMENT

5. Observation and Remarks

The Assam state CAMPA has implemented CAMPA activities under four major categories, namely, Nursery management (1.5 ha and 3 ha nurseries), Plantation Management (SSP, Afforestation, Sal coppice, ANR and Apurugiya), Infrastructure& Road Developments (APCs, ATBs, FFCs, FGQs, FQs, RFOQs, WTs, etc., and improvement & maintenance of forest roads and EPTs) & Other Works (TCDs and SAs). The performances of these activities, which were executed under the CAMPA in both the periods of 2017-18 to 2018-19, have been assessed and the evaluation methodology as well as the findings have been discussed in the above-mentioned sections.

Following are the observations & remarks identified based on the inputs received from the field evaluators:

A. During the monitoring and evaluation process, it was found that nursery/plantation-related works, such as preparation of nursery beds, weeding, maintenance, etc., and civil works for protection mechanism, such as construction of RCC poles, fencings, signboards, etc., were combined with the same scope of work for interested agencies/contractors who had applied for the civil works. However, it is to be noted that the expertise required for nursery/plantation-related works is different from that of civil works, and not many contractors involved in civil works will have the field knowledge to carry out nursery/plantation-related works. Hence, for better quality of output in nursery and plantation activities, it is suggested that only experienced /competent agencies in such areas or Forest Department itself, should carry out works.

1. Nurseries:

B. It was observed that in a few cases funds were not released on time/delayed for the improvement as well as maintenance of the continued nurseries which resulted in low percentage of poly pot seedlings. One example is of Nagaon SF Division. Hence, timely disbursal of funds should be done for efficient and effective management of the CAMPA nurseries.

- C. During onsite visit of one 1.5 ha nursery in Dhemaji Forest Division, the field staff confirmed that the nursery was abandoned since 2017, however, on verification of documents it was found that fund was released for the financial year 2018-19. Similarly, during the visit to one1.5-ha and one 3-ha nursery in Hailakandi Forest Division, respective field staff informed that both the nurseries were discontinued in 2017-18, but after verification of UC and nursery journal, it was found that funds were sanctioned and utilized in the year 2018-19 as well. However, no polypots were found in the 1.5 ha nursery and no new seedlings were found in the 3-ha nursery. The discrepancy in information needs to be checked because these nurseries were not found in the list of discontinued nurseries.
- D. In Baksa division, a nursery of 1.5 ha nursery was found in poor condition because it was completely damaged by river, and there were no polypots available. As this site was not suitable for nursery, Forest department may take suitable action to either shift the site or discontinue this nursery. Furthermore, the site suitability of the place where nurseries are to be established should be reviewed by respective Forest Divisions Officers before finalizing the sites and allocating it for creation.

2. Plantations:

- E. In most of the plantations, plantation journals and other documents were found on site and were in order except in one case of Sal coppice plantations located in Kulsi Range under Kamrup West Forest Division. It was confirmed by the Range Forest Officer of Kulsi Range and Technical Assistant of Kamrup West division that disciplinary action has been initiated by the Forest Department against the previous Range Forest Officer for the misuse of fund that was released for implementing maintenance of the plantation.
- F. Further during field visit of 50 ha Afforestation plantation (maintenance) located in Ultapani Range under Haltugaon division in BTC Kokrajhar Circle, the field evaluators found that the plantation was destroyed by local villagers. Also, the documents under Ultapani range were damaged due to fire in the office, which was set by the local

villagers, and an FIR was shown in its support. There appears some social problem in the region because a few incidents of illegal encroachment were also noticed. In order to check such activities and to protect the forest, Forest Department may like to deploy more field staff and undertake some special programmes/ activities involving local people to create awareness for forest protection and maintain a cordial relationship with them.

3. Infrastructures:

- G. Forest roads: Most of the forest roads inspected have been maintained well. It was observed that in one case, a few stretches of sloppy portions of a 25 km forest patrolling path in AIE valley division, Bongaigaon were eroded. It was found that fund was disbursed only once for the improvement and maintenance of forest roads in the year 2017-18. Hence, release of some funds to ensure proper maintenance of the patrolling roads in such sloppy areas is suggested.
- H. **Buildings:** In Kaziranga National Park, there was a slight mismatch of GPS co-ordinates of two infrastructures, one ATB in Kohora Range and one APC in Eastern Range, compared to what was provided by the Assam State CAMPA. However, buildings were found to be constructed exactly as per plan and estimate. GPS coordinates of these two sites therefore be rechecked and corrected.

Sub: Guidance for drawing APO for 2020-21 regarding.

Madam/Sir,

The undersigned will draw your kind attention regarding inclusion of two important activities in the APO for 2021-2022 of the State CAMPA. These activities, namely "Treatment of degraded forest watersheds as per DPR prepared by using Lidar technology" and "Forestry interventions for rejuvenation of major rivers as per DPR prepared by ICFRE" were deliberated in the meeting of State Forest Ministers chaired by Shri Prakash Javadekar, Hon'ble Minister of Environment, Forest & Climate Change, GoI held on 17.08.2020. These will enhance quality of forest, increase the forest and tree cover of the country and meet the objectives of the CAF Act, 2016.

2. The efficacy of implementation of catchment area treatment plan (CATP) in one major ridge area inside a forest block of each State/UT as per a Detailed Project Report (DPR) prepared by using LiDAR technology will boost soil and moisture conservation, fodder augmentation and improve the forest quality. This was first discussed in the meeting of State Forest Ministers held on 30.11.2019. It was then decided that every State would identify one forest block as per criteria circulated in DO letter dated 13.12.2019 of this Ministry and implement CATP as per the DPR prepared by the Government of India using the LiDAR technology. The work related to the preparation of the DPRs has been assigned to M/s WAPCOS Ltd, a GoI Undertaking, and the DPRs will be handed over to the States in March 2021. To reap the benefits of this exercise, it is essential that its thorough implementation in the forest block is complete before the onset of monsoon.

3. You are also aware that the ICFRE is preparing a DPR for forestry interventions required for rejuvenation of 13 major rivers, namely Beas, Chenab, Jhelum, Ravi, Sutlej, Luni, Yamuna, Narmada, Godavari, Kaveri, Krishna, Brahmaputra and Mahanadi. This will be in addition to the DPR for forestry interventions for rejuvenation of river Ganga, which is being implemented by the National Mission on Clean Ganga, with the cooperation of the concerned State Governments. Afforestation in catchment of major rivers as per the DPR will supplement the efforts towards enhancement of forest cover, increase in ground water recharge and reduction in soil erosion. In addition, a healthy riverine ecosystem will help in improving livelihoods of millions of fellow citizens who are directly or indirectly dependent on river water ecosystems.

4. Hence, it is requested to take necessary action for inclusion of these activities as major initiatives of the Annual Plan of Operation (APO) for 2021-22 and provision of sufficient fund be made in the Budget for 2021-22 of the State for this purpose.
