Minutes of the 18th meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Authority.

<u>Venue</u>: Krishna Conference Room through Hybrid Mode (Personal Attendance and Video conferencing)

Date & Time: 20th June 2022 at 3.00 PM and 27th June 2022

The list of members and other participants who attended the meeting is attached at Annexure-A.

- 1. The meeting of the Executive Committee (EC) of the National Authority was held on 20th of June 2022 under the chairmanship of the Director General of Forests & Special Secretary (DGF&SS), MoEF&CC, and Chairperson, Executive Committee of the National Authority. The Chief Executive Officer (CEO), National Authority welcomed the DGF &SS, the Chairman of EC and all other members of the Executive Committee and the officers present in the meeting.
- 2. With the permission of the Chairperson, the CEO National Authority briefly explained the action taken on the decision of the 17th Executive Committee and the agenda items of the 18th meeting. Thereafter, agenda items of the Executive Committee were taken up for detailed discussion.
- 3. Agenda item No 1. Confirmation of Minutes of the 17thMeeting of the EC of the National Authority: The Executive Committee confirmed the minutes of the 17th meeting of EC held on the 1st of June 2022 at 10.00 AM.
- Agenda Item no. 2: Action Taken Report on 17th Meeting of the EC:
 The action taken report on the decision of the 17th meeting of the EC of the National Authority was perused and noted.

PART-A: GENERAL DECISIONS/ OBSERVATIONS OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:

i. DGF&SS emphasized that the States/UTs Forest Departments must carry out Compensatory Afforestation (CA) against the Forest Land diverted as per the provisions of the Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980 (FCA, 1980) from the Compensatory Afforestation amount realized from various user agencies. He asked CEOs of States/UTs CAMPA to submit the detailed information to National Authority on the Compensatory Afforestation carried out against each case of diversion of forest land to ascertain whether CAs have been carried out against diversion of each forest land under various FC clearance cases. He also advised State CEOs to work out specific amount of interest required for completion of CA against each proposal.

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- ii. CEO, National Authority observed that few State CAMPA are still maintaining CAMPA Funds from Ad-hoc Authority which should have been deposited with the National Authority as per the provisions contained in Section 4(3) of the Compensatory Afforestation Fund (CAF) Act, 2016. Since some of the States have not established the procedure of expenditure from the state funds, they were temporarily allowed to utilize such money with the approval of the competent authority. However, now there is no need as State CAMPA Authorities are functional in all States/ UTs. The Executive Committee directed that the unspent balance of all monies available in various Bank Accounts of Ad-hoc Authority should be deposited in the respective State Public Accounts and the same should be confirmed to National Authority within 31.08.2022.
- iii. DGF&SS raised the issue of timely submission of APOS by CAMPA of States/UTs. He observed that still after a lapse of around four months of Current Financial Year, few States/ UTs have still not submitted APOs. He reiterated that due diligence should be done while preparing APOs as per the spirit and provisions of CAF Act and Rules.
- iv. AS&FA stressed the need for proper checks and balances in spending funds from CAMPA and finalisation of Annual Accounts of all State/UTs CAMPA Authorities upto the previous Financial Year (FY 2021-22). He stressed the need for developing a Dashboard for CAMPA for transparency, efficiency and effective communication.
- v. CEO, National Authority invited attention of all CEOs of State/UTs CAMPA for proper monitoring of CAMPA activities both physical and Financial. The internal concurrent monitoring of the Department should invariably be done after completion of any CAMPA activity. Third Party Agencies selected for monitoring and evaluation of CAMPA works should be independent and should generally not be under the control of State Government. CEO, State/ UT Authorities should regularly monitor the expenditure on the activities permitted in the approved APO. The social audit should also be reflected in the Monitoring and Evaluation Reports about the employment generation and other benefits to local communities from the CAMPA activities.
- vi. DGF&SS stressed the need of adopting modern technologies in implementation and regular monitoring of CAMPA activities including office management. He asked States to share success stories, good practices and learnings for sharing with other States.
- vii. CEO, NA CAMPA asked States/ UTs for carrying out Rapid Assessment of status of CA created since 2010-11 onwards with use of Remote Sensing Technology, Drones etc.

8. AGENDA ITEMS NO: 3 TO 8

Decision: The Executive Committee discussed APOs for the FY 2022-2023 from 6 State/UT Authorities (Uttarakhand, Haryana, Punjab, Bihar, Sikkim, and Arunachal Pradesh) in detail and sought information/comments from concerned States and IROs as and when required. The APOs of Uttarakhand, Punjab and Bihar were discussed but not approved for want of relevant details.

The approved activities of APOs and their details for remaining States/UTs in the 18th EC meeting are annexed at Annexure B (i to vi).

9. AGENDA ITEMS NO: 10 TO 15

Decision: Executive Committee discussed deferred items/ activities of APOs for the FY 2022-2023 from 6 State/UT Authorities (Maharashtra, Chhattisgarh, Madhya Pradesh, Jharkhand, Telangana, Kerala and Uttar Pradesh) in detail and approved activities under CAF 2018 rules. The deferred activities of Andhra Pradesh, Chhattisgarh, and Kerala could not be discussed for want of relevant details.

PART D- APPROVAL/ DECISION ON SCHEMES AND OTHER ITEMS SEEKING FINANCIAL SUPPORT FROM THE NATIONAL FUND OF CAMPA

Agenda Item No. 9: Update on Schemes/ Pilot Project initiated under National Fund

A. Proposal of Wildlife Institute of India (WII), Dehradun for 'No cost extension' of the scheme -Operationalizing the UNESCO Category 2 Centre-World Natural Heritage Management & Training for Asia-Pacific Region" implemented by the WII, Dehradun

The proposal submitted by WII for No cost extension of C2C Project for another two years i.e. 2022-2024 along with revalidation of unspent balance amount of Rs.3,14,74,136/- after the approval of DGF&SS and Chairperson of EC was sent to IFD on 05.07.2022. IFD vide their note 14/15.07.2022 desired following clarification:

i. PD to confirm the objectives envisaged for the project have been satisfactorily achieved

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- ii. The reasons for extension sought for another two years
- iii. Is it continuation of sub-projects, activities etc., or some new activities are being planned.

It was desired by IFD to place it before the next EC and WII asked to present the project details and information sought above before EC.

Background: NCAC- Operationalizing the UNESCO Category 2 Centre (C2C)-World Natural Heritage Management & Training for Asia-Pacific Regionis an ongoing scheme initially approved by the National CAMPA Advisory Council (NCAC) with a total financial outlay of Rs. 18.66 crores for a period of 6 years from 2013-14 to 2018-19.

The Governing Body of National Authority in its 1st meeting held on 5th November 2019 approved for extension of schemes for another three years from 2019-2022 with 'no cost extension'.

The proposal was deliberated in detail in the 16th Executive Committee of the National Authority the proposal for 'no cost extension of schemes for another two years (i.e. 2022-2023 and 2023-2024) to complete the envisaged tasks mentioned in the schemes. Dr Gautam Talukdar, Scientist, WII made a presentation before the EC on the Project.

WII has given following justification for No Cost Extension of C2C Project:

- i. Implementation of major activities in the years 2020-21 and 2021-22 were restricted due to the COVID pandemic situation worldwide. Planned expenditure included both the National and the Global mandate and due to restriction of foreign travel, the envisioned international programmes remained suspended in the Asia Pacific region. Similarly, the proposed Certificate Course in Heritage Management aimed for participants from Asia Pacific countries was kept on abeyance.
- ii. The Agreement between UNESCO and Government of India for the WII-C2C continues to be in force until 2024, and subsequently subject to renewal. The article 9 of the agreement states, "Article 9 Contribution by the Government 1. The Government shall provide all the resources, either financial or in kind, needed for the Administration and proper functioning of the Centre." Hence, continued funding support is mandatory in abidance to the agreement. Accordingly, the no cost extension of C2C has been duly recommended by the 37 meeting of the Finance committee of WII, chaired by DG Forests &SS.
- iii. India has been elected currently as a member to the UNESCO World Heritage Committee in Paris for 2021-2025. The Director, has been nominated as an expert (natural heritage) on India's delegation as part of its membership to the World Heritage Committee. The natural heritage expertise of the WII-C2C will be crucial in supporting the Government of India in this role at the multilateral level.
- iv. As part of the ongoing Periodic Reporting 3rd-cycle for World Heritage Sites of the Asia and Pacific Region, MoEFCC has designated the Director, Wildlife Institute of

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India as National Focal Point for the World Heritage Sites (Natural/Mixed) in India. WII-C2C is coordinating this entire reporting process in India as well as playing advisory role for the Asia and Pacific Region.

WII requested for approval of

- 1. 'No cost Extension for another two years i.e., 2022-23 & 2023-2024.
- 2. Revalidation of Balance amount available with WII- Rs. 3.14 Crore for FY 2022-23;

EC was informed about the important role of the UNESCO Category- 2 Centre at WII. ADG, FC and Director, WII informed that it is a very important centre for Asia-Pacific Region and will help in building capacity in conservation.

Decision of EC:

AS&FA, MOEF&CC advised for making the Centre operational by running it on project mode instead of being dependent on CAMPA Funds for capacity building. AS&FA sought the detailed information on activities which have been completed and those pending against the balance amount and the amount required for completion of each activity along with time required. The Centre should generate its own funds for carrying out the training/ capacity building activities and should not be dependent on CAMPA Fund. EC after detailed discussion approved following

- EC agreed for revalidation of Rs. 3.14 crore balance amount available with WII for 2022-23.
- WII to confirm the deposit of interest earned so far on the project fund into Public accounts of India.
- WII to furnish action plan for completing the proposed activities for 2022-24 and submit a detailed activity-wise proposal for making the Centre operational with specific timelines.

The proposal was recommended for consideration and approval of Governing body

B. Project Proposal "Implementing the Central Asian Flyway National Action Plan with special focus on the preparation of site-specific activity plan, capacity building, developing bird sensitivity map for setting up of wind energy and species action plans" with a total outlay of Rs.3.754 crore implemented by Bombay National History Society Mumbai, for a period of three years.

Decision: The proposal was discussed in EC Meeting. DGF&SS asked how the Project has helped the States in conservation of birds and how the Forest Departments of States/UTs are involved. AS&FA asked for more details on the activities implemented and their outcome. The proposal is required to be discussed in detail about the activities proposed, implementation schedule, achievements and outcomes. EC directed that Wildlife Division should monitor the progress and furnish its comments before the EC.

EC asked State CEO to submit the above details of CA against the Forest Land diverted as per the provisions of the Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980 (FCA, 1980) and the State Authority shall make necessary changes in the APO as per CAF Rules, 2018.

The Committee decided to take up the APO 2022-23 of Uttarakhand State Authority for discussion in the next Executive Committee meeting.


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Agenda Item No.4: Annual Plan of Operation (APO) of Haryana State CAMPA for the financial year 2022-23




Agenda Item No.15: Annual Plan of Operation (APO) of Uttar Pradesh State CAMPA for the financial year 2022-23

Agenda Item No.16: Any other matter with the permission of chair.

1. Agenda Item No.16.1: APO for the year 2022-23 of Andhra Pradesh State Authority-deferred items.

The APO of Andhra Pradesh State CAMPA was discussed in 16th and 17th EC of the National Authority. During the 16th Executive Committee meeting of the National Authority has approved APO of 2022-23 at total cost of Rs.162.94 crore and deferred Rs.65.53 crore out of proposed outlay of Rs.286.15 crore.

During17th Executive Committee meeting of the National Authority, the Executive Committee deliberated and approved deferred items the APO of 2022-23 with financial outlay of Rs.61.15 crore.

Decision: The Committee asked to State Authority to present the APO 2022-23 in detail in the next Executive Committee meeting for consideration.

Additional Agenda Item No. 16.2- Proposal for funding of National Mission for a Green India under CAMPA

The Mission Document was revised by the Mission Directorate aligning it with the recommendations to generate additional carbon sequestration capacity of 2.5 to 3 billion tonnes CO₂ equivalent through additional forest and tree cover for the period 2021-2030, and was approved by the Secretary, MOEF&CC with in-principle approval of Prime Minister's Executive Committee on Climate Change. As per the communication received from the Climate Change Division, focal point for NAPCC in the MoEF&CC, the Mission Directorate was apprised to initiate the implementation of the Mission in accordance with the approved document.

Objectives of the Scheme

The Mission aims at responding to Climate Change through a combination of adaptation and mitigation measures which will help in enhancing carbon sinks in sustainably managed forests and other ecosystems, adaptation of vulnerable ecosystems and adaptation of forest-dependent communities. The Mission aims for:

- Improved quality of forest cover and increased forest and tree cover on forest/nonforest lands
- Improved ecosystem services including biodiversity, hydrological services and carbon sequestration
- Increased forest-based livelihoods and household income of forest dependent communities living in and around the forests.
- Providing support for creation of an additional carbon sink of 2.5 to 3.0 billion tonnes of CO₂ equivalent by 2030.

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The total proposed outlay for the 10 years' duration is Rs. 12,190 crores of which Rs. 5000 crores including the state share, would be a part of CSS component and shall be disbursed to the states in accordance with the fund disbursement guidelines for the Central Sponsored Schemes under Government of India. Rs. 7190 crores would be provided under the National CAMPA funds to cover around 7.00 Lakh Ha area and shall be disbursed to the States in accordance with the provisions of the Compensatory Afforestation Fund (CAF) Act, 2016.

Accordingly, on yearly basis an amount of Rs 719.00 Crore will be required for taking up the activities. Innovative and demonstrative eco-restoration projects will be supported in priority vulnerable landscapes which have the greatest potential to mitigate the impacts of climate change and include holistic eco-restoration measures for restoration of degraded landscapes, grasslands, scrublands, Rejuvenation of rivers and wetlands, Eco-restoration of Mangrove areas; rehabilitation of shifting cultivation areas, combating desertification, development of green wall for restoration of Aravalli's, ravine reclamation.

A presentation was made by Programme Division, NAEB/GIM

Decision: The Programme Division IGF, NAEB was asked to work out details of modalities after discussion with States for consideration in next Executive Committee meeting.

Additional Agenda Item No.16.3: Proposal for grant of funds from National CAMPA Funds for Establishing Metapopulation of Cheetahs in India -2022-23

Programme Division for the Project/ Scheme- NTCA/ Project Tiger Division of the Ministry of Environment, forest & Climate change

Proposal: The National Tiger Conservation Authority (NTCA) has submitted a proposal for establishing viable cheetah populations in a metapopulation framework according to the Action plan on introduction of cheetah in India based on IUCN guidelines. For the long-term viability of the cheetah in India, it is essential to establish 3-5 breeding populations in suitable habitats and then manage them as a metapopulation with supplementation of wild Cheetahs from Southern Africa as may be required. The instant proposal pertains to actual transfer of cheetah from South Africa and Namibia to India, their soft release and staging, release as free-ranging animals at Kuno National Park, and subsequent monitoring required for establishing breeding populations. For establishing metapopulations, the proposal also includes ecological restoration of Gandhi Sagar Wildlife Sanctuary and Nauradehi Wildlife Sanctuary to prepare the area for establishing other cheetah populations.

Project Objectives:

 To establish breeding cheetah populations in safe habitats across its historical range and manage them as a metapopulation.

- 2. To use the cheetah as a charismatic flagship and umbrella species to garner resources for restoring open forest and savanna systems that will benefit biodiversity and ecosystem services from these ecosystems.
- To enhance India's capacity to sequester carbon through ecosystem restoration
 activities in cheetah conservation areas and thereby contribute towards the
 global climate change mitigation goals.
- 4. To use the ensuing opportunity for eco-development and eco-tourism to enhance local community livelihoods.
- 5. To manage any conflict by cheetah or other wildlife with local communities within cheetah conservation areas expediently through compensation, awareness, and management actions to win community support.

Project Duration: One year

Project Cost: Rs. 30.05 crores approx.

The funds will be utilized on following activities:

- 1. International transportation of cheetah from Namibia and South Africa to India by air,
- 2. Fencing part of Gandhi Sagar Wildlife Sanctuary/Nauradehi WLS for ecological restoration so as to make the site ready for cheetah release,
- 3. Implementation and monitoring including (i) staff engagement (engagement of veterinarians, biologists, technicians and other work force), (ii) field logistics procurement of radiocollars, veterinary equipment, miscellaneous capture equipment, (iii) operational costs of animal capture, (iv) monitoring, consultancy for national and international experts for Cheetah management.

The detail break of project cost is given in table 1.

Project Outcomes:

Initiating the establishment of viable cheetah population(s) in India beginning at Kuno National Park along with recovery and management of grassland and open forest systems at the release site and commencing ecological restoration of Gandhi Sagar Wildlife Sanctuary. Conserving and enhancing the faunal diversity, especially the threatened and endangered species in grassland and open forest habitats by securing and consolidating these neglected ecosystems. Capacity building of State Forest Departments in wildlife and habitat management by imparting knowledge and training on latest techniques in monitoring, capture and translocation and technology enabled protection.

Project Justification:


Cheetah is the only large carnivore species that has gone extinct in independent India. The efforts of Ministry of Environment, Forest & Climate Change are in the advanced stages to introduce this species in its historical range in India. Recently, the Government of India has also signed a MoU with Government of Republic of Namibia for Cheetah

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
introduction in India. In light of these latest developments, this proposal of NTCA for establishing Cheetah metapopulation has significant impact on carnivore conservation in the country and the same may be considered for funding support under CAMPA.

Discussion: A presentation was made by ADG, NTCA before the Executive Committee. He informed that this is first time in the history of intercontinental translocation of a major wildlife species which is extinct in India since 1948. He informed that funds under the relevant budget of Project Tiger are not available for the purpose. This being a very important time bound wildlife conservation initiative, the project is submitted to National Authority, CAMPA for obtaining the financial assistance from National Fund. The Project is eligible as per provisions of CAF Act & Rules.


It was deliberated that the instant Project/ Scheme proposal for assistance from National Fund can be covered under CAF Act, 2016 Section 15 (1)(ii)&(iii), ie. Formulate proposals for scheme and execute them specified in sub-clause (iii) of clause (b) of section 5 of the Act.

The scheme in section 5 of the Act includes in the Explanation – For the purpose of this section, "Scheme "includes any institutes, society, centre of excellence in the field of forest and wildlife, pilot schemes, standardisation of codes and guidelines and such other related activities for the forestry and wildlife sector.

Decision:

Considering important nature of the project for wildlife conservation by re-introduction of an extinct species in the country, the Executive Committee recommended the proposal scheme of establishing metapopulation of Cheetah in Madhya Pradesh and other centres subject to total amount of Rs.20 Cr for approval of Governing Body as proposed by the Programme Division NTCA with following conditions:

- 1. No vehicle will be purchased. The programme Division will hire required number vehicles.
- 2. Seventy percent of funds to be released in first instalment.



3. Monitoring reports to be submitted to National authority as per schedule.

Additional Agenda Item No -16.4: Bringing efficiency, visibility and transparency in flow of National CAMPA Fund.

National CAMPA Authority is administering 10% of the Fund received from User Agencies which is deposited in National Fund and maintained in Public Accounts of India. The present corpus ia approx. Rs. 7,211 crores. A number of Schemes/ Projects have been approved and funded from the National Fund. National Authority does not have adequate man power. There is no Accounts and Finance official at present. The process for engaging Finance & accounts person has been initiated but it may take time.

There is an urgent need for ensuring proper flow of funds and monitoring of expenditure incurred under National Fund. This requires suitable mechanism/ system in place in the National Authority. In this context, relevant provisions contained in recent instructions of Department of Expenditure in their O.M dated 09th March, 2022 regarding implementation of Central Sector Schemes may be considered for bringing efficiency, visibility and transparency in flow of funds from CAMPA to various Agencies/ Institutions receiving funds from National CAMPA Fund.

Decision: The Executive Committee of NA noted and considered the proposal. CEO, NA was directed to prepare a proposal after considering the relevant provisions in consultation with IFD for approval of the Competent Authority.
