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Agenda Item No. 1: Confirmation of Minutes of 18thmeeting of Executive Committee of National Authority

Minutes of the 18th Meeting of Executive Committee of National Authority circulated vide OM of even No. dated 01.08.2022 is placed before Executive Committee for Confirmation. The Minutes of meeting of 18th Executive Committee is placed at **Annexure-I.**

1	DGF&SS emphasized that the States/ UTs Forest Departments must carry out Compensatory Afforestation (CA) against the Forest Land diverted as per the provisions of the Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980 (FCA, 1980) from the Compensatory Afforestation amount realized from various user agencies. He asked CEOs of States/UTs CAMPA to submit the detailed information to National Authority on the Compensatory Afforestation carried out against each case of diversion of forest land to ascertain whether CAs have been carried out against diversion of each forest land under various FC clearance cases. He also advised State CEOs to work out specific amount of interest required for completion of CA against each proposal.	Directions/ Minutes of meetings were communicated to all States/ UTs vide OM dated 01.08.2022
2	CEO, National Authority observed that few State CAMPA are still maintaining CAMPA Funds from Ad-hoc Authority which should have been deposited with the National Authority as per the provisions contained in Section 4(3) of the Compensatory Afforestation Fund (CAF) Act, 2016. Since some of the States have not established the procedure of expenditure from the state funds, they were temporarily allowed to utilize such money with the approval of the competent authority. However, now there is no need as State CAMPA Authorities are functional in all States/ UTs. The Executive Committee directed that the unspent balance of all monies available in various Bank Accounts of Ad-hoc Authority should be deposited in the respective State Public Accounts and the same should be confirmed to National Authority within 31.08.2022. Annual Plan of Operation for the financial year 2022-23 has been received from the form the Uttarakhand State CAMPA Authority, Government of Uttarakhand vide letter no. 110/GoI/2022-23 dated 26.05.2022. The State Steering Committee of State CAMPA Uttarakhand has approved the Annual Plan of Operation (APO) in its meeting held on 24.05.2022 for an outlay of **Rs.418.98 crores** only for the year 2022-23.

<u>Agenda Item No.12:</u> Request for Proposal (RFP) for Programme Management Consultancy Unit in National Authority

In the 16th EC Meeting, a proposal for creation of Project Management Unit in the National Authority along with setting up of National Monitoring and Evaluation Centre (NMEC) was discussed and approved. Accordingly, the proposal was placed for IFD concurrence. After internal discussions it was felt that instead of Project Management Unit, a Program Management Consultancy (PMC) should be considered. PMC will be hired from suitable consultancy firms after going through the process of RFP. The PMC Unit will enhance capacity and capability of CEO, National Authority office in effective discharge of its function as mandated in the CAF Act, 2016 and Programme Management Consultancy Unit once deployed through suitable Consultancy Firm will fill critical gaps in functions of the office of National Authority immediately.

The Program Management Consultancy Unit will help the National Authority in developing and implementing a long-term Perspective Plan and Monitoring and Evaluation Framework under the CAF Act and Rules including setting up of National Monitoring & Evaluation Centre (NMEC) at National Authority.

The NMEC will have subject matter specialist, consultants, expertise, associated manpower along with data management and GIS facility & logistics support to coordinate and carry out monitoring and evaluation work related to CAMPA fund. The NMEC with the help of PMC will create the matrix of monitoring and evaluation and will engage experts, field assistant, domain area professionals and office support for carrying out survey, monitoring, evaluation, rapid assessment, report generation and other assigned work.

The PMC will form the core unit for implementing the Planning, Monitoring & Evaluation strategy of National CAMPA. The overall vision of the PMC is to support the National CAMPA in efficient use of funds as per the CAMPA Act while addressing the strategic requirements of the forestry sector and mitigating the effects of diversion of forest land through efficient systems and processes, data management, monitoring and use of technology. The PMC shall also facilitate the implementation of effective monitoring and evaluation activities to ensure effective utilisation of the CAMPA fund.

2. The scope of Works of the PMC is as follows :

- i. PMC shall analyse and appraise the Annual Plan of Operations (APOs) provided by the States/ UTs, develop a uniform framework for the APO and co-relate information between FC diversion, CA data and actual work done.
- ii. It will track the work done in relation to the approvals given by the NA/ Ministry at the time of diversion of forest land in each of the cases.
- iii. PMC shall develop reporting format for APO, quarterly reports, annual reports, audit reports, field survey reports and third party evaluation reports. This shall ensure uniformity in the reporting formats across all the state reports.

- iv. PMC will have the requisite competencies for designing the upgraded IT based geo-spatial based monitoring portal. It will coordinate among the State/ UT CAMPA units, and will undertake collection, storage and analyse data, implement the geo-spatial portal for monitoring, and thus help in reporting and preparation of Annual reports.
- v. PMC will coordinate among various agencies, both government and non-government for collection of data, research and adoption of best practices.
- vi. It will leverage and support activities under the various streams within the Ministry related to the country's plan for combating climate change, land degradation and biodiversity and wildlife conservation. Tracking of the afforestation and other activities would also be done.
- vii. PMC shall support the Monitoring Group with adequate data and reports from time to time and as directed and shall follow up on the decisions of the Monitoring Group.
- viii. Based on several decisions and identified issues, the PMC shall undertake monitoring and evaluation activities of CAMPA activities in the field by undertaking field surveys and cross check the activities as per the APO. The field surveys could be planned on a six monthly, annual or biennial basis depending on the requirement.
- ix. Field survey should be supported with photographic, video graphic and other evidence.
- x. All the data collected by the PMC should be well archived and uploaded on the online portal to better understand the audit trail and to maintain integrity and accountability.
- xi. PMC will identify key stakeholders and develop communications strategy for CAMPA and develop extension material as per the strategy.
- xii. The PMC will help in organisation of workshops and seminars through identification of topics, resources persons, participants, and support in management.
- xiii. The National Authority CAMPA, apart from collating physical and financial progress information along with details of activities and their impact from the respective State CAMPAs, will also independently verify through a well-designed sampling plan, the works implemented on the ground under the funds of CAMPA. The field survey works would be conducted both through the PMC as well as third party as per requirement.
- xiv. Adequate data management and data collection systems would also be developed, which will be working in sync with the GIS based portal described above for most effective outcomes.
- xv. Any other requirement(s) of National Authority.

3. Expected Budget Requirement:

Expected budget requirement for the project will be around Rs.2.00 crore per annum. The project period for the First Phase will be for 3 years and extendible. Therefore, an allocation of Rs.6.00 crore for three years is proposed to be approved by Executive Committee to be spent from the National CAMPA Fund.

4. **Requirement of Human Resource in PMC** The proposal of "Request for Proposal (RFP) for Selection of Consultancy Firm for Establishment of Programme Management Consultancy (PMC) under National Authority, CAMPA" is resubmitted after making necessary modifications for consideration and concurrence by IFD.

2. It is reiterated that the National Authority is in urgent need of professional consulting agency for supporting/ assisting the Authority in effectively carrying out various functions of planning, approval of APOs, coordination and monitoring & evaluation of CAMPA activities and schemes under National Fund. The RFP document for has been drafted based on requirement of National Authority, CAMPA.

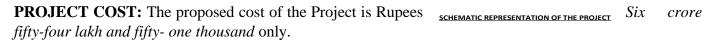
Agenda item No- 13: Project Proposal of Nagaland State CAMPA for Transitioning from Shifting to Settled Land Use seeking support from National Fund

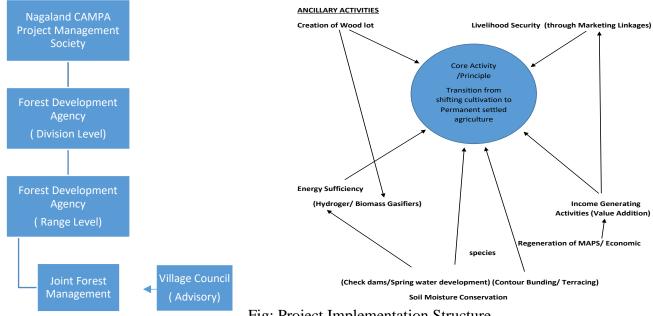
Nagaland State CAMPA has submitted a project proposal on "Transitioning from Shifting to Settled Land Use" with a total outlay of Rs.6.54 Crore for a period of 4 years.

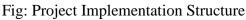
Shifting cultivation or Jhum is the major agricultural system for food production in Nagaland, practiced by all its tribal communities. The basic principle of Jhum cultivation is the alternation of short cropping phases (usually one or two years) with fallow phases of natural (or slightly modified) vegetation. In most of the Naga tribes, the major proportion of land is held as common village land, which is either Jhum land or community forestland. The land earmarked as Jhum land, does not belong to any individual but to the entire community and the land is regulated by the Village Councils. Requirements for other nutrients like Phosphorus, Sulphur and micronutrients are met with local and preferably renewable resources. Likewise, Alder (Alnus nepalensis), a non-leguminous tree which fixes 150 kg atmospheric N/ ha (Sharma et al. 2002), is also grown in many fields under shifting cultivation of Nagaland.

1. PROJECT IMPLEMENTATION STRUCTURE

For the purpose of implementing of the project for Enhancing Sustainability of Jhum it is proposed that the implementing agency at the grassroots level will be the Joint Forest Management Committees under the aegis of the Village Council. At the state level, Nagaland CAMPA Project Management Society shall be the Project Management Unit. The society shall be the apex authority for supervision and execution of the project. The organisational structure of the Nagaland CAMPA Project Management Society is enclosed in the annexure.

Agenda item No: 14: ICFRE proposal for extension of three months for the scheme "Estimation of Economic Losses in real terms on per hectare basis due to Forest Fire in Uttarakhand and Madhya Pradesh"

1. ICFRE has submitted a request letter for No Cost Extension for a period of 3 months (i.e. 1st September 2022 to 30th November 2022) towards the scheme on "Estimation of Economic losses in real terms on per ha basis due to Forest fire in Uttarakhand and Madhya Pradesh " was approved for period of 24 months at a total cost of Rs.3.78 Crores during the period of 24 months. The scheme was implemented by ICFRE, Dehradun in partnership with FSI, Dehradun: WII Dehradun, National Institute of Hydrology (NIH) Roorkee and G.B Pant National Institute of Himalayan Environment and Sustainable Development, Almora.

- 2. The reason for the extension of the scheme are given below: -
 - The provisional drafts of the reports submitted by five partner institutes involved in the project are being studied and analyzed by ICFRE. The provisional draft reports are expected to go through revision to bring uniformity in content and presentation. Based on the revised draft reports of the partner institutes a consolidated report is to be prepared by ICFRE, the discussion on which is being conducted with the partner institutes.
 - The study will be a bench mark for all further studies on forest fire. Therefore, the detailed discussions are required to refine the results. The draft report submission to MoEF&CC National Authority CAMPA will only be possible by 30 August 2022. The final report submission and its printing will require more time as the report will be corrected and synthesized as per comments of MoEF&CC.
- 3. ICFRE has requested for extension of scheme for 3 months from 1.09.2022 to 30.11.2022.

Agenda Note-15: Approval for the proposal for creation of 1000 Nagar Vans under Nagar Van Yojana.

National Afforestation Eco-Development Board (NAEB) of MoEFCC has submitted a proposal for Nagar Van Yojana (NVY) is being implemented by the Ministry with funding from National Authority of CAMPA.

The primary objective of NVY is to create forest/green spaces in urban areas by developing Nagar Van/Vatikas, with a view to protect forest land within cities/towns or its fringes from degradation and encroachment. The scheme is designed to actively engage local residents and different agencies in developing bio-diverse forests for social and environmental benefits in an urban landscape. Nagar Van Yojana (NVY) envisages developing 400 Nagar Vans and 200 Nagar Vatikas (total 600 Nagar van/vatika) in the country during the period of 2020-21 to 2024-25 with a total cost of Rs.895 crore. The Central grants from funds under National Authority of CAMPA is provided under the scheme to cover mainly the cost of fencing, soil-moisture conservation measures & related activities, administrative activities, plantation and maintenance.

2. So far, 250 projects have been sanctioned in 29 States/UTs. Out of 250 projects 173 projects have been sanctioned in 2021-22 with the total cost of Rs. 17,667.86 lakhs and 1st instalment release of Rs. 12,429.09 lakhs whereas during 2022-23, 77 projects have been approved with a total cost of Rs. 3674.22 lakhs, for which, release of 1st instalment of Rs. 2571.96 lakhs is under process. The details of total 250 projects are annexed (Annexure I and II).

3. Now it has been envisaged to create 1000 Nagar Van/Vatikas under the scheme. In view of the various initiatives of the Ministry, more proposals expected to be received from the States. The proposal for approving additional 300 Nagar Vans and 100 Nagar Vatikas, over the extended period of two more years, *i.e* till 2026-27, is under submission.

4. Now it has been envisaged to expand the ambit of the scheme and to create 1000 Nagar Van/Vatikas under the scheme. In view of the various initiatives of the ministry, more proposals expected to be received from the States. The proposal was appraised during the review meeting by HMEFCC on 16th August, 2022. The proposal for approving additional 300 Nagar Vans and 100 Nagar Vatikas, over the extended period of two more years i.e till 2025-26 and 2026-27 is under submission for approval as per the details below:

- 1. Approval for creation of additional 300 Nagar Vans and 100 Nagar Vatikas to meet the 1000 Nagar Van target.
- 2. Approval for additional fund allocation from CAMPA to the tune of Rs. 640 crores (Total budget allocation would be (Rs 895 crore +Rs. 640 crore) Rs.1535 crores over seven-year period (From 2020-21 to 2026-27).
- 3. Approval for modifying the City area limit from existing 5 km to 10 km range
- 4. Extending the period of implementation of the project upto year 2026-27

The above proposal is placed for approval of Executive Committee, National CAMPA .

Agenda item No: 16: 'No cost extension' of the scheme "Execution of Readiness Activities for Implementation of REDD+ (Reducing emissions from deforestation and forest degradation) in India" is being implemented by ICFRE at a total cost of Rs. 226.46 lakh for a period of 18 months.

Indian Council of Forestry Research and Education, Dehradun vide their letter no. 1-62/2019/BCC/ICFRE/374 dated 08.07.2022 have requested for no cost extension of the Execution of readiness activities for implementation of REDD+ in India up to December 2022.

2. Execution of readiness activities for implementation of REDD+ is an ongoing scheme initially approved by the National CAMPA Advisory Council (NCAC) with a total financial outlay of Rs. 2.646 crore for a period of 18 months.

3. The Executive Committee of the National Authority has recommended extension of schemes for another three years from 2019-2022 with 'No cost extension' and the same was duly approved by the Governing Body of National Authority in its 1st meeting held on 5th November, 2019. Till date Rs. crore was released by the National Authority.

4. The project of the scheme is for developing of a safeguard information system for Redd+ through stakeholder's construction process with an outlay of Rs.40.00 lakh. Development of Redd+ learning and knowledge sharing platform, web-based SIS module and networking of relevant stakeholders with outlay of Rs. 30.00 lakhs.

The Agenda Item is placed for consideration of the 19th Executive Committee of the National Authority.

Agenda item No- 17: Goa State Authority- Raising of Compensatory Afforestation plantation of 220 hectares submitted by State Authority of Goa.

The State Authority of Goa has submitted the details and it was mentioned that the approval for 2022-23 included 300Ha CA plantation in Madhya Pradesh as "Raising of CA plantation in other State to clear Backlog". However, the efforts for identification of suitable land (degraded forests) in Goa are underway. In this series the reports of IFSR,2019, & IFSR,2021 were referred and with the help of GIS cell in department, open forest areas were identified and after field verification, degraded forest land of 220 Ha is considered suitable for Compensatory Afforestation.

Accordingly, it is proposed that Compensatory Afforestation in 220 Ha may be carried out in this year (2022-23) in addition to 200 Ha already approved by Executive Committee of the National CAMPA.

Further, it was mentioned that Goa Forest Department proposed to carryout 220 Ha CA plantation in 2022-23 against the 300 Ha plantation proposed to be implanted by Madhya Pradesh under "Raising of CA plantation in other State to Clear Backlog". The process of identification of degraded forest in Goa is underway and 220 Ha has already been identified and proposed for 2022-23. The balance 80Ha plantation shall be carried out in 2023-24 without fail so as to complete the target proposed in Madhya Pradesh for the year 2022-23

a. Financial support to National Forest Inventory (NFI) activity of Forest Survey of India for the period 2022-23 to 2027-28:

The proposal submitted by Forest Survey of India for Financial support to National Forest Inventory (NFI) activity of FSI for the period 2022-23 to 2027-28 with an outlay of Rs.89.08 crores for a period of 5 years.

In the FR, DG(FSI) has informed that in the 5th meeting of the National CAMPA Advisory Council held on 24th November, 2014 under the chairmanship of Hon'ble Union Minister of State (I/C) for Environment, Forest and Climate Change, In this meeting, it was decided that Ministry will grant financial support to FSI for developing FSI as a Centre of Excellence.

Accordingly, FSI prepared a proposal containing nine new activities and requirements of funds. The ministry has provided Rs. 75.00 Crore for these nine activities. FSI has also informed that one of the activities submitted was monitoring of incremental carbon stock of India's forests by switching over to grid-based design. FSI switched over a grid-based design since 2016. Under the new design about 13,000 sample plots are being laid out in the forest area and 20,000 sample plots are laid out in TOF. The workload under the new design has increased almost double as compared to the old district-based design. Moreover, the travel expenses in carrying out field inventory has been enormously increased due to spread of the girds in the entire country.

It is further to inform you that the additional funds granted under Centre of Excellence was withdrawn by the ministry, in view of the notification of CAMPA rules in 2019. As a result, there is a paucity of the funds to complete the NFI work from the regular budget of FSI. DG, FSI further informed that NFI constitute an important activity of FSI. The output of NFI i.e., Growing Stock, Tree Cover and Carbon Stock form important inputs for biennial publications of FSI i.e., ISFR. Further it also helps in monitoring of NDC target of the country.
