THE MINUTES OF THE 22nd MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE NATIONAL AUTHORITY

The 22nd meeting of the Executive Committee (EC) of the National Authority was held in Krishna Conference Room, Indira Paryavaran Bhawan, New Delhi on 31st March, 18th April and 24th April, 2023 under the chairmanship of the Director General of Forests & Special Secretary (DGF&SS), MoEF&CC, and Chairperson, Executive Committee of the National Authority. The list of members and other participants who participated in the meeting is attached at **Annexure I**.

2. The proceedings of the meeting are given hereunder:

General Discussion and Directions of Executive Committee:

- Chief Executive Officer (CEO), National Authority and Member Secretary, EC welcomed DGF &SS, the Chairman and members of the Executive Committee and the officers present in the meeting. He extended warm welcome to the IROs who attended the meeting online.
- 2) The DGF&SS welcomed all members and officers present in the meeting and those who were present online. He urged Non-official Members for giving their views and guidance in the meeting and informed that the Executive Committee gives due regard to their suggestions while considering the APOs from State Authorities as per the provisions of the Compensatory Afforestation Fund (CAF) Act, 2016, and CAF Rules, 2018.
- 3) The DGF&SS reiterated that CAMPA funds should be utilised judiciously and with due diligence for meeting the main objectives of compensating the loss of forest and ecosystem services. These funds should not be spent on routine protection activities which are to be supported from State funds. DGF&SS emphasised that the CAMPA funds is additionality and not a supplementary fund to meet the shortages in the State Fund. The fund under CAMPA are to be utilized primarily for undertaking regeneration (both artificial and assisted natural regeneration) to compensate the loss of forest and create more forest, for improvement in quality of forests and the wildlife habitat including augmentation of fodder and water for wildlife. As a principle, at least 80 per cent of the CAMPA funds should be utilized for the purpose of forest regeneration and improvement in quality of forest and maximum of 20% only be used for essential infrastructure support and capacity building that has direct impact on extension and improvement of forest cover and wildlife habitat.
- 4) DGF &SS stressed that the CAF Rules should be followed while selecting right kind of activities. The protection of forest, forest related infrastructure development, wildlife protection, wildlife-human conflict mitigation and other ancillary activities are to be taken up through other funds (e.g. State Plan, CSS schemes etc.) Therefore, the States/UTs CAMPA Authorities should propose their funding under CAMPA as a matter of exception and only after weighing adequate justification. Once again the

- 80:20 principle is reiterated above shall be followed. In the afforestation locally suitable species should be planted.
- 5) The DGF&SS mentioned that NPV funds are very precious and meant for overall improvement of quality of forests and improving ecosystem services of permanent nature and require focussed approach and systematic efforts for long term benefits. It is noted that the States are in the practice of utilising NPV monies to the maximum extent in the routine activities like fire protection, road maintenance, building construction, hiring of vehicles, general protection of forests & wildlife, boundary demarcations including continuous engagement of casual labours for most of the forest beats etc. Further, securing forest land and installation of boundary pillars, trenches for the entire forest area is primarily the State Government's responsibility including implementation of approved working plans for the forest areas and management plans for the protected areas. Therefore, NPV component in the APOs should be focused for site specific forest regeneration and restoration activities which require greater degree of resources and attention in short time to overcome the challenges for effective outcomes. As a matter of principle, not more than 20% of the NPV funds available with the State should not be spent annually except in special programmes/ projects, where it can go upto 25% of NPV.
- 6) CEO, National Authority mentioned that as decided in the 21st EC meeting, the data of Compensatory Afforestation (CA) required to be carried out against each project in respect of which forest land was diverted since 1980 has not been reconciled in many States. The cost of CA was realised by the respective State Governments before the year 2006 from 1980 and the States were responsible for raising the CA before the Ad-hoc CAMPA was set up at the Central Government. The National Authority has reconciled data on receipt of compensatory levies since 2018-19 upto 2021-22, and the reconciliation of compensatory levies from May, 2006 upto 2018-19 has also been mostly reconciled and State share has been transferred to concerned States.
- 7) CEO further informed EC that the National Authority is working on reconciliation of data of CA carried out in respect of each forest diversion proposal (FCA approval wise). Initially geo-referenced locations of CA sites were not linked with the proposal for seeking FC Clearance and project-wise data is not readily available with the States. The State Nodal Officer, FCA and CEO CAMPA should work out from the records and if required concerned IRO should be consulted. The DGF&SS directed all CEOs of State/UT Authorities and IROs to make available data on year wise Compensatory Afforestation since beginning i.e. 1980 to the National Authority by 15.05.2023.
- 8) The DGF&SS directed CEOs of States/ UTs that after reconciliation of CA areas against each proposal of diversion of forest land should be brought before FAC and approval for any change of CA location should be obtained from the Competent Authority. The DGF&SS urged to keep all the records in order.
- 9) CEO apprised EC that integrated APOs have been obtained from States which include the amount received and utilised under Centrally Sponsored Schemes as well as State funds.
- 10) The AS&FA mentioned that State Forest Departments have not utilised funds under CSS and lot of funds have lapsed. As regards to accounting of CAMPA assets and

plantations, he suggested that forest resource accounting principles need to be adopted in consultation with State's Accountant General as Forests/ plantation are biological resources and are vulnerable to external changes.

- 11) The ADG (Wildlife) suggested four areas of immediate action by the States/UTs:
 - i. The areas under Integrated Wildlife Management Plan (IWMP) to be declared as plastic free zone.
 - ii. Focusing on dissemination of local knowledge among local people living within 10 km of wild life area.
 - iii. Following the Wetland Rule to prohibit the discharge of wastes from villages, towns, cities, industries, etc. and solid waste dumping into the wetlands. If the wetland is situated within 10 km of wild life area its management plan is needed to be made and implemented.
 - iv. Cost benefit analysis of area falling in wild life areas are required to be done, what is the present carbon foot print and what would be post project implementation required to be worked out.
 - v. He advised that IROs should regularly monitor CAMPA activities and the CA sites and wildlife habitat improvement activities implemented from CAMPA funds should be visited by IRO teams regularly.
- 12) The DGF&SS emphasized on regular monitoring of CAMPA activities and stressed that the State Forest Department must ensure a mechanism for internal monitoring by senior officers not connected with the implementation. He directed that a copy of approved APO should be endorsed to IROs for proper monitoring. IROs should focus on quality of works, measurable outcomes and constraints, if any. IROs were directed to submit the detailed report after monitoring of the CAMPA activities.
- 13) The DGF&SS invited Odisha Forest Department for making a presentation on digitisation of forest boundaries and Chhattisgarh Forest Department on soil and water conservation. He appreciated the wildlife habitat improvement works and forest fire control measures in Odisha, Soil and Moisture Conservation works in Chhattisgarh and the research works in the State of Uttarakhand and Karnataka. Himachal Pradesh was requested to prepare a document on their works related to mitigating monkeyhuman conflicts for sharing with other States.
- 14) The DGF&SS asked the State of Odisha to formulate standard operating procedure for digitization, reconciliation and drafting of gazette notifications mentioning the boundaries with geo-coordinates. APCCF IT made detailed presentation and explained the process followed for digitisation and revised notification of boundaries. He and CEO, Odisha assured to provide SoP for guidance of other States/UTs by 15.05.2023.
- 15) A presentation was made by National Authority on proposed nursery website and app. The DGF&SS urged the States/UTs to furnish the information on nurseries on the website that will be launched soon. He clarified that it is the responsibility of the DFO to maintain and update the information. The website should give information on available saplings in the nurseries to the interested public and provide relevant information about suitability of trees for various purposes such as agro forestry, medicinal plants, fruit-bearing local trees and their benefits. DGF&SS advised that a model nursery at least one in each district of the State/UT should be developed. Model

nurseries can provide excellent public interface and forestry programmes and CAMPA activities can be highlighted by State Forest Departments. He mentioned that the model nurseries need not be created afresh but can be developed by upgrading existing nurseries. Model Nursery may also be developed in the vicinity of Nagar Van. The model nursery should include interpretation center, sale/distribution counter, nature/awareness interpretation center and facilities for training. The information shall be available in the local language. The facilities, availabilities of plants, shrubs, herbs and other nursery inputs should be placed in public domain so that people can collect saplings and get required information about various plants. Madhya Pradesh was requested to prepare a documentation on "Approaching the public and local communities towards nature and trees" as a reference material for all the DFOs and field officials.

- 16) EC was informed that pursuant to the decision taken in the third meeting of the Governing Body, the guidelines on procurement of vehicles from NPV funds for meeting operational requirement of frontline forest staff are being prepared by the committee under the chairmanship of Dr S. P. Yadav, Additional Director General of Forests, Forest Conservation.
- 17) States/UTs were requested to submit information on release of funds for Integrated Wildlife Management Plan activity. It was mentioned that Karnataka has surrendered approximately Rs. 30 crores funds under Project Tiger as they were not able to locate their funds.
- 18) The DGF&SS emphasised on timely completion of balance afforestation especially the data available for erstwhile Madhya Pradesh need to be reconciled by the States of Madhya Pradesh and Chhattisgarh so that the CA area backlogs of approximately 40,000 ha. could be brought under compensatory afforestation as per the provisions of Forest (Conservation) Rules, 2022 framed under the FC Act, 1980.
- 19) The CEO, NA suggested States to implement soil & moisture conservation works as per the DPR on the river rejuvenation prepared by ICFRE for 13 rivers and Namami Gange Mission DPR. Further, the soil and water conservation measures should be done with minimum of concrete works in the ridge to valley approach. The soil and water conservation structure should be carried out scientifically from Ridge to valley approach with site specific requirement with correct geo-referenced location on the map.
- 20) The DGF&SS impressed upon the CEOs of States/UTs CAMPA and other officer present that as CAMPA activities aim for restoration and improvement of forest and enhancement of ecosystem services and are thus integral for sustainability of life on the planet. He advised that Forest Department can play an important role in implementation of Mission LiFE by spreading the message to local people living in remote areas. Therefore, the CAMPA activities should also highlight LiFE action for encouraging people about mindful and deliberate utilisation of natural resources and sustainable life style. The activities related to achievement of objectives of Mission LiFE should be made integral part of the relevant CAMPA activities.
- 21) EC members and some States suggested for increasing the annual interest rates on CAMPA funds to 6% at National level to ensure full and timely release of funds.

The CEO, National Authority informed about the Third Meeting of the Governing Body held on 15.02.2023 under the chairmanship of Hon'ble Minister, Environment, Forest & Climate Change and explained briefly on the decisions taken in the meeting.

Decision of Executive Committee: The EC approved the mandatory items of APO with suitable modification. While discussing the APO of Uttar Pradesh State, it has been observed that the activities of routine nature are proposed from the NPV head. The NPV amount available with the State is very limited in respect of Uttar Pradesh. Since CAMPA funds are an additional fund for compensating the loss of forest land and ecosystem services and are not supposed to replace State funds. 2. In this context, it is relevant to inform that approved items of CAMPA activities are provided in the CAF Rules, 2018. The National Authority has been giving guidelines/ instructions from time to time in the various meetings of the Executive Committee and the Governing Body. Some of the relevant instructions are given below:

- i) The fund under CAMPA are to be utilized primarily for undertaking regeneration (both artificial and assisted natural regeneration) to compensate the loss of forest and create more forest inter-alia for improvement in quality of forests and the wildlife habitat, that is for augmentation of fodder and water for wildlife. As a principle, at least 80 per cent of the Compensatory Afforestation Management and planning Authority (CAMPA) funds should be utilized for the purpose of forest regeneration and improvement in quality of forest and maximum of 20% only be used for essential infrastructure support and capacity building that has direct impact on extension and improvement of forest cover and wildlife habitat, reiterated above shall be followed.
- ii) Protection of forest, forest related infrastructure development, wildlife protection, wildlife-human conflict mitigation and other ancillary activities are to be supported through other funds (e.g. State



Plan, CSS schemes etc.) Therefore, the States/UTS CAMPA Authorities should propose their funding under CAMPA as a matter of exception and only after weighing adequate justification. Once again the 80:20 principle

- iii) Use of CAMPA funds for Van Mahotsav/ publicity, forest protection, public awareness, capacity building etc. must directly be linked to forest regeneration and improvement in forest cover/wildlife habitat in area terms. Area (in Ha) should be the monitorable parameter for these activities. Hence geo-coordinates of treated sites shall be invariably uploaded on e- Green watch portal in time. Vehicle, if in exceptional cases only for CAMPA related works required should be hired instead procurement for frontline staff only. Forest/Wildlife Protection Force/ Mobile Squad shall not be funded under CAMPA, as this is primarily the responsibility of State Govt./UT Administration.
- iv) For improvement of wildlife habitat, CAMPA fund should be utilized only for raising of fodder and fruit bearing trees, soil & moisture conservation, augmentation measures and invasive weed control. Fencing and construction of essential protection infrastructure if required in exceptional circumstances may be done under CAMPA fund by using locally available eco-friendly materials and only after assessing site specific requirement.
- v) All major activities in PA areas shall be part of approved Wildlife Management Plan. For activities in Tiger Reserves, the NTCA and for activities in other PA areas, the wildlife division of MoEF&CC should be consulted before hand. The wildlife species based conservation activities are to be proposed in the sanctuaries.
- vi) The soil and water conservation structure should be carried out scientifically from Ridge to valley approach. In the APO uniform structure with physical and financial outlays are proposed which should be site specific of appropriate dimension as per field requirement with correct geo-referenced location on the map.
- vii) Details of activities proposed under Working Plan should be specifically mentioned.
- viii) Improvement of forest roads should be done from State Funds.
- ix) The details of the fund proposed for number of divisions is similar irrespective of vulnerability and threats and considering the site specific threats perceptions from protection point of view.
- x) Details of survey and mapping of forest areas.

In view of above points, the additional information in the APO should be submitted at the earliest.





AGENDA ITEM NO.18: STRENGTHENING CEO NATIONAL CAMPA OFFICE WITH PROFESSIONAL MANPOWER FOR MONITORING OF CAMPA ACTIVITIES AND APPRAISAL OF APOS AND SCHEMES/PROJECTS

The proposal for strengthening of office of the CEO, National Authority by engaging Program Management Consultancy (PMC) and National CAMPA Monitoring and Evaluation Team (NMET) was first placed before 2nd meeting of Governing Body after recommendation by Executive Committee. The Governing Body advised to engage IIFM for providing PMC and NMET. However the proposal of IIFM was not agreed to by the EC in its 21st meeting held on 02.02.2023 and CEO National Authority was asked to prepare proposal for engagement of professional manpower at appropriate level for strengthening the CEO office for proper discharge of its function. 2. Appraisal and Management Team for appraisal of APOs, Schemes and projects, planning and managements of CAMPA activities and funds. The Appraisal and Management Team will consist of eight consultants in the field of forestry, wildlife, forest economics/statistics, IT, Soil & Water conservation. Provision of Young Professional is also made to assist the expert members including professionals with experience in data analysis and report writing.

Functions of Appraisal and Management Team: The consultants/ expert members will be responsible for preparation and implementation of Perspective Plan, scrutiny of Annual Plan of Operations (APOs) submitted by various States/UTs and Schemes/ project proposals submitted by Programme Divisions of the Ministry for approval, develop and implement reporting mechanisms. In addition, they will coordinate the compilation and analysis of data for preparation of various reports viz. quarterly & annual reports, field reports and third-party evaluation reports design a research development component under CAMPA.

Objectives of the Project

- To promote activities for increasing the green cover across the country through tree plantation and related activities
- To promote sectoral level water conservation, water harvesting and water use efficiency/savings, including treatment and reuse of waste water
- To promote natural and regenerative agricultural practices and land restoration to improve productivity, soil health and nutritional value of food produced, while reducing the harmful impact on surrounding ecosystems
- To promote sustainable and improved practices for waste management, including collection and treatment
- To promote a range of measures, to be undertaken by Municipalities, Gram Panchayats or Industrial entities, for reducing air pollution
- To promote a range of measures, to be undertaken by Municipalities, Gram Panchayats or community groups, for conservation and restoration of mangroves.

Decision of the Executive Committee:

During the meeting, the Executive Committee decided to accord in-principle approval for Rs.10 crores for this scheme. Initially, Rs. 1.0 crore shall be allocated for starting work/mobilisation under this scheme and subsequent release of the fund shall be based on the progress achieved under the scheme.

1. AGENDA ITEM NO. 20.01:- PROPOSAL FOR ESTABLISHMENT OF CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE IN FOREST SURVEY OF INDIA SUBMITTED BY FSI, DEHRADUN

- 1. Centre of Excellence Project: IG (FC) highlighted the salary requirement of Senior Technical Assistants (STAs) in IROs. In this regard, it was finally decided that a single project may be made on the pattern of earlier Centre of Excellence Project to be financed under National CAMPA. This CoE project will take care the needs of STAs, e-Green Watch improvements and any other futuristic requirements". FSI has further informed that two of the above activities namely e-Green Watch and WEB GIS based Decision Support System (DSS) for Forest Clearance, which were sanctioned under earlier CoE project, are continued at present. However, the salary of the contractual staff engaged under these two activities is being paid from one of the sanctioned CAMPA Project "Monitoring of Plantations under CAF" as no other funds are available with FSI.
- 2. Accordingly, FSI has prepared a revised Centre of Excellence project containing the following activities.

2. AGENDA ITEM NO. 20.02:- PROPOSAL FOR STUDY ON IMPACT OF VOLUNTARY RELOCATION OF VILLAGES FROM TIGER RESERVES SUBMITTED BY IIFM, BHOPAL

i. OBJECTIVES: The objectives of the study are of two types:

There are 54 tiger reserves in the country in 18 states. Many tiger reserves have had relocations stretching back to the 1970s, from Kanha. Presently CAMPA funds are also used in voluntary relocation of villages. IIFM has proposed to carry out a study for evaluation of socio-economic and ecological impacts of relocation. This provides an opportunity to quantify the outcomes at various time intervals after the relocation process.

a. Impact on the relocated villagers

- Measure the impact of relocation on the change in household income of villagers
- Quantify the difference in vulnerability to climate change due to relocations.
- Measure changes in the quality of life using various standard indicators.

b. Impact on the wildlife habitat at the original site of the relocated village

- Quantify the changes in vegetation at and around the relocated village areas.
- Quantify changes in wildlife abundance in the relocated village areas.

ii. Methodology

- Tiger Reserves of the country where relocation of villages has been done will be selected in consultation with NTCA.
- Villages will be sampled from these tiger reserves after appropriate stratification.
- Stratification will be done using social and ecological criteria after understanding the specific characteristics of each location.

The Executive Committee desired that the study should be completed within 6 months timeframe. The Executive Committee also directed that the study should document the ground work done by the forest officials, initial processes/ approaches for consultation followed for consultation with the affected people for accepting the proposal of their relocation and led to the success of voluntary relocation. This will serve as guidance for other protected areas.



3. AGENDA ITEM NO. 20.03:- SUPPORT OF MANGROVE PLANTATION UNDER MISSION MANGROVE INITIATIVE FOR SHORELINE HABITATS AND TANGIBLE INCOME (MISHTI) FROM NATIONAL FUND.

Mangrove forests are important natural infrastructure helping in stabilisation of coastline ecosystem, reducing erosion, protect nearby habitation from storms and flooding of low-lying sandbanks. The mangroves absorb storm surge impacts during extreme weather events such as hurricanes/Tsunamis. Their dense roots help bind and build soils and above-ground roots slowdown water flows and encourage sediment deposits thus reduce coastal erosion. The complex mangrove root systems filter nitrates, phosphates and other pollutants from the water, improving the water quality flowing from rivers and streams into sea. Mangroves provide important ecosystem service and help in mitigation of climate change by capturing significant amounts of CO₂ and storing in coastal soils, also known as "blue carbon". Mangrove forests also provide habitat and refuge to a wide array of wildlife such as birds, fish, invertebrates, mammals and plants. Estuarine habitats with coastal mangrove shorelines and tree roots are important for marine species including shrimp, crabs, and many commercial fish species whereas branches of the mangroves act as bird nesting areas.

In view of great significance of mangroves, Mission MISHTI has been launched by the Ministry for restoration and conservation of Mangroves. IGF, GIM gave a detailed presentation before the Executive Committee. Mangrove Mission (Mission MISTHI – Healthy Mangroves Wealthy Coast) envisages to comprehensively explore the possible area for development of Mangroves. The Mission will cover approximately 540 Sq km spread across 11 States and 2 Union Territories and in 5 years (2023-2028). The State wise area for raising of mangrove plantation has been worked out along with delineation on Gram Panchayat maps for each identified area. There potential area identified lies in 1630 Gram Panchayats. The estimated cost of the Mission is Rs. 1890 Crores. The fund for the mission is mapped as below:

(a)	MNREGA – MoRD	Rs. 900 Cr
(b)	GCF Grant + NCM	Rs. 15 Cr
(c)	CAMPA Component	Rs. 825 Cr
(d)	Proposed NCRMP-NDMA	Rs. 150 Cr

The GIM Directorate and CSM Division have proposed that MISHTI Mission envisages CAMPA fund to support State Forest Department for carrying out mangroves restoration, afforestation and conservation activates. Other ancillary activities such as livelihood, protection of plantation etc. will be carried out through convergence with NGNREGA and other programs.

Decision of the Executive Committee:

The Executive Committee approved the proposal for recommending to Governing Body for providing assistance to the MISHTI mission from CAMPA funds including National Fund. The concerned States may also utilise State CAMPA fund in the mission. It was decided that the afforestation, conservation and restoration of mangrove forests under MISHTI Mission should be implemented by State Forest Department of concerned States with the coordination of Green India Mission, Directorate on the lines of Nagar Van. The ADG Forest & Director GIM should prepare suitable guidelines in consultation with States and CSM division for the purpose.



4. AGENDA ITEM NO. 20.04:- PROPOSAL FOR ADMISSIBILITY OF TA/DA TO CONSULTANTS OF NATIONAL AUTHORITY

According to the Government of India orders issued from time to time, Consultants will be allowed TA, DA and Hotel Accommodation in connection with the official work as per the provisions of SR 190, however travel allowance would be allowed for journey for train in 2nd AC, travel charges through taxi on actual basis for travel within the city, food bill up to Rs 500 per day and hotel charges up to Rs. 2,000 per day, subject to the actual expenditure.

The consultants of National Authority are required to travel extensively in connection with attending meetings, reconciliation of accounts and afforestation activities in the States, monitoring of schemes funded by the National Authority and assessment of CAMPA activities in States.

In order to accomplish time bound nature of task, the Consultants of NA may be allowed Air travel at Government expenses in Economy class.
