THE MINUTES OF THE 24th MEETING OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF THE NATIONAL AUTHORITY

The 24th Meeting of the Executive Committee (EC) of the National Authority was held in Krishna Conference Room, Indira Paryavaran Bhawan, New Delhi on 31st August, 2023 under the chairmanship of the Director General of Forests & Special Secretary (DGF&SS), MoEF&CC. The list of members and other participants who participated in the meeting is attached at **Annexure I.**

2. The proceedings of the meeting are given hereunder:

GENERAL DISCUSSION AND DIRECTIONS OF EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:

- The CEO, National Authority and Member Secretary, Executive Committee welcomed the DGF&SS and Chairperson of the EC, and all the members and officers present in the meeting.
- 2) The DGF&SS welcomed the members and officers present in the meeting.
- 3) The CEO, National Authority informed that the provisional information about reconciliation of compensatory afforestation with respect to forest diversion proposals under Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980 has been received from 29 States and Union Territories. It is still awaited from 6 States and UTs namely Chandigarh, Dadra and Nagar Haveli and Daman and Diu, Delhi, Haryana, Himachal Pradesh and Nagaland. However, the data has to be authenticated by the committee of concerned IRO, Nodal officer, FC and the CEO, State CAMPA.
- 4) The CEO, National Authority informed that a web portal is being developed for digital preparation of APOs under PARIVESH 2.0 which is in advanced stage and all efforts are being made to make it operational in next 3 months. A presentation on digital APO module was made by PARIVESH 2.0 development team in the meeting for inviting the comments, improvements, and suggestions. The committee and officers present suggested for need of training for DFOs and other field officials, preparation of manual and consultations with States to incorporate all suggestions and State specific requirements.
- 5) The CEO, National Authority further informed that the C&AG Audit of annual accounts of the year 2022-23 of the National Authority has been conducted in July, 2023. The audit team was also apprised about the action taken by the National Authority office in compliance of the shortcomings/ deficiencies mentioned by previous audit teams for the Annual Accounts of 2018-19 till 2021-22.
- 6) The National CAMPA organised a consultative workshop for preparation of indicative guidelines on estimates of Compensatory Afforestation for carrying out comprehensive ecological restoration of degraded forests and creation of new forests on non-forest land.
- 7) The DGF&SS emphasized the need of close supervision by PCCF & HoFF who are also the Chairperson of the State Executive Committee on all issues related to implementation, monitoring and accounting of expenditure related to CAMPA activities.
- 8) The DGF&SS urged PCCFs & HoFFs that the respective Chief Secretary should be apprised for convening regular meetings of the State Steering Committees for discharging

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- of functions and duties of Steering Committees as provided in the CAF Act 2016. Regular meetings by the Chief Secretary will ensure timely release of funds and proper monitoring of CAMPA activities and regular Audits of accounts of State/UT CAMPA.
- 9) The CEO, National Authority informed the EC that in the recently held PCCFs conference at IIFM, Bhopal, many important issues related to effective implementation of CAMPA were discussed. PCCFs and HoFFs were requested for taking suitable action by in their States/UTs on following:
 - (a) There are long delays in forwarding of States/UTs APOs to National Authority. It has been reiterated that States Authorities should prepare a perspective plan for implementation of CAMPA activities. The APOs should be sent to National CAMPA alongwith format of Integrated APO circulated for the purpose of holistic picture of forestry activities envisaged and funds available under various heads.
 - (b) The State CAMPA Authorities in most of the States are not functioning as statutory authorities in accordance with the provisions of the Compensatory Afforestation Fund Act, 2016 and Rules, 2018. The State CEOs are frequently posted and transferred without gazette notification and notifying to the National Authority.
 - (c) There is an urgent need to strengthen State/UT CAMPA with adequate officers and professional manpower for carrying out the functions mandated in the Act.
 - (d) The meetings of Steering Committees of States and Union Territories are not convened timely which are required to be conducted at least once in three months as per the provisions of the Act for discharging the functions as detailed in Section 18 (1) of the CAF Act. There is no oversight of the Steering Committee on the process of timely preparation and forwarding of Annual plan of Operations to National CAMPA, timely release of CAMPA funds and monitoring of the progress of implementation of CAMPA activities. As a result, there is delay/non release of CAMPA funds to State Forest Department affecting implementation of afforestation activities. It is necessary that Steering Committee should regularly monitor and evaluate the works under CAMPA.
 - (e) The meetings of the Executive Committees of States are also not being organized as required in the CAF Act which are required to perform functions as detailed in Section 19(1) of the CAF Act.
 - (f) The States have been requested to complete the reconciliation of data on compensatory afforestation data with FCA project wise details on Compensatory Afforestation area, Penal Compensatory Afforestation area, forest protection, Integrated Wildlife Management Plan, Catchment Area Treatment Plan etc. vis a vis funds deposited by User Agencies as per the required format circulated by National Authority without delay. In this regard a Committee of IRO Nodal Officer FCA and CEO CAMPA has been constituted for reconciliation and verification of data on diversion of forest land and CA created since 1980. In case there is change in CA sites, approval of the Central Government should be obtained. It was further decided that the information needs to be compiled within next two months and same would be reviewed in October 2023 in the forthcoming PCCF Conference.
 - (g) There are long delays in release of CAMPA Funds by the state Governments to the State Forest departments which affects the implementation of Compensatory

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- Afforestation and other activities as per approved APOs. Chief Secretary and ACS/PS Finance should be regularly apprised for timely release of CAMPA funds.
- (h) The PCCF & HoFFs were requested to submit the information on the progress of Compensatory Afforestation to National Authority.
- (i) Since, State CAMPA funds are non-lapsable and interest bearing, it has been noticed that many State Governments are not crediting interest amount on State CAMPA Fund, which is required as per the CAF Act. The interest amount is envisaged to meet increased cost of CAMPA activities in future and office expenditure of State Authority.
- (j) The accounts of the State CAMPA have not been audited by C&AG till date in most of States/UTS. The regular audit by the C&AG also needs to be initiated by State CAMPA after sending annual accounts and requesting AG of the concerned State for expediting audit.
- (k) Apart from this internal monitoring and third-party monitoring should be taken up by the States. The PCCF should closely coordinate with the State Government for timely release of the State CAMPA fund for implementation of the activities as per approved APOs.
- 10) The status of accounting and audit of State/UT CAMPA was discussed. It was informed that the accounting has to be on the formats prescribed by the C&AG office, which will be shared with the State/UT CAMPA by the National Authority.
- 11) It was noticed that multiple Chartered Accountants are engaged for audit of CAMPA account at State and division level. The AS&FA advised that only one CA for State CAMPA may be engaged who can also audit the accounts of various divisions. He asked CEO National CAMPA that for this purpose the necessary directions in consultation with Integrated Finance Department, MoEF&CC, New Delhi may be communicated to States.

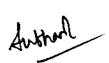

Decision of the Executive Committee:

Hon'ble High Court of Madras in its order dated 8th August, 2023 in the matter of W.M.P (MD). No. 1962 of 2022 in WP(MD) Nos. 19771 & 23901 of 2018, 8222 & 19652 of 2020 filed by Thiru. S. Manoj Immanuvel and others has passed following directions: -



i) the respondents no. 104 and 105 to forthwith provide funds by releasing the same to the National Tiger Conservation Authority/103rd respondent, who in turn will release it to the fifth respondent/Principal Chief Conservator of Forests, State of Tamil Nadu, within a period of two months from the date of receipt of the copy of the Order.

(ii) the sum thereof shall be disbursed and the relocation carried out within a period of one month thereafter.

(iii) Call this matter on 10.10.2023 for reporting compliance.

The Executive Committee of National CAMPA was informed about the orders dated 08.08.2023 of Hon'ble Madras High Court with directions to National CAMPA and State CAMPA for providing necessary funds to the State through NTCA for the purpose. The EC was apprised of the provisions of CAF Act & CAF Rules including those applicable for voluntary relocation of villages from protected areas.

The Executive Committee noted that the utilization of fund by the State CAMPA Tamil Nadu is very poor during 2019-20 to 2022-23. It is also observed that the there is also delay in release of fund by the State Government to the State CAMPA/SFD despite the approval given by Executive Committee for the APO. The State Government has also not paid interest as per the provision of section 4 (5) & (6) of the CAF Act, 2016.

The Executive Committee discussed all the relevant sections and Rules and noted that CAMPA funds are special funds and there is no provision under Section 5. (b) (iii) of the Act for providing funds from National CAMPA Fund for relocation purpose since this provision already exist under other schemes like Centrally Sponsored Schemes (CSS) of Project Tiger etc. and also the CAF Rule 5. (2) (h) provides for NPV funds of State CAMPA Fund for relocation of villages from Protected Areas. The AS&FA wanted to know from CEO, Tamil Nadu State CAMPA whether the State Government of Tamil Nadu has utilized fund allocated to them under the Centrally Sponsored Schemes of Project Tiger implemented by NTCA. While going through the details furnished by the State CAMPA in the APO, it was pointed out that the level of utilization by State under CSS is very low. State has not even informed whether they have incurred expenditure from relevant CSS of Project Tiger. It was also not clear whether the State has made demand to NTCA under CSS in the previous years for the purpose.

The CEO, National Authority informed that Tamil Nadu State CAMPA was requested to revisit their APO to provide funds for relocation as much as possible from State CAMPA. However, the revised APO 2023-24 received through e-mail on 30th August, 2023 (Evening) without mentioning the amount of NPV available with them for relocation of villages. Tamil Nadu State CAMPA has not been able to obtain amount of accrued interest to State CAMPA fund which would have enabled the Executive Committee to ascertain the actual State CAMPA fund under NPV component. The Executive Committee, therefore, approved the amount of Rs. 32 crores as per CAF rule 5(2) (h) out of available fund of Rs. 41.0803 crores under NPV component for the purpose of relocation of villages from Protected Areas.

In view of the above, the Executive Committee approved the APO of State CAMPA of Tamil Nadu after necessary modification as given against each item with total outlay of Rs. 44.149 crore including Rs. 32 crore for village relocation.

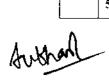

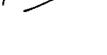

Brief note & Justification	Tiger Reserves as ecosystems provide the natural capital which deliver vital functions and services for peoples' lives and well-being. Tiger reserves are also vital for regulating and perpetuating ecological processes to ensure continuity of natural evolutionary processes. At appropriate way of recognizing the power of ecological systems for sustaining life and flowing inputs to the society is to assess their full range of values. Such an appraisal of ecological value of forest-based ecosystems boils down into monetization of both use value and non use value to understand whole array of ecosystem services available there. Indeed, the valuation of all benefits from natural involving several composite functions and interactions of biological processes is hard to quantify completely, and there is an issue of thin or missing market condition as well as inter temporal constraints. The proposed research will therefore identify first the ecosystem services which are recognizable and then estimate their values in the context of Tiger Reserves in the country. The proposed study will provide quantitative and qualitative estimates of the natural capital stored in selected tiger reserves of India to make benefits emanating from and embedded in these tiger reserves visible to economies and society. Recognition of benefits is likely to create an evidence base which will pave the way for more targeted and enhanced investment in these repositories of genetic information. Of the 54 Tiger Reserves, previous research by IIFM and NTCA had established valuations flora total of 16 Tiger Reserves, 6 in the first phase and 10 in the second phase. It is now proposed to extend this work to its third phase and estimate values for 10 more Tiger Reserves.

The present study intends to adopt a comprehensive framework to assess values for identified services of the ecosystem in 12 selected tiger reserves involving following broad scopes.

(a) Assessing the monetary value of ecological assets in terms of material and nonmaterial flow of services using field level evidences along with available secondary information in 12 Tiger Reserves.

- (b) Comparative evaluation of changes in the value of ecological assets in terms of material and non-material flow of services with respect to spatial and temporal variability.
- (c) For selected Tiger Reserves, demonstration of how the ecosystem service valuation approach can quantify trade-offs in ecosystem services generated through different management activities, and point the way towards rational decision making.
- (d) To conduct capacity building and training programme for Tiger Reserve Forest Department field officers and staff

There is a need for capacity building development in areas viz. forest certification, restoration ecology, carbon market, circular economy, climate change, ecosystem services valuation and sustainable forest management. The institute therefore proposes to increase the number of training and capacity building programmes to reach out to various stakeholders. Implementation of these programmes would be done through improvements in facilities and competencies.

The institute is running several short courses and plans to increase the number of programmes in the near future to help all stakeholders, to acquire relevant knowledge and skill sets that will enhance sustainable management of forests, Sustainable Development and the profile of conservation, livelihood, business in environment, forest and climate change and sustainable management practices in the country.

At present, the institute has a facility to accommodate 350 students on twin sharing bass. With the given infrastructure available at the institute, it is not sufficient to run the in house academic, training capacity building and research programmes on various themes for multiple stakeholders.

Hence, it has been proposed to build training infrastructure especially construction of hostel accommodation of 300 rooms with added facilities at IIFM campus to accommodate student participants in various academic programmes and 60 room research and training hostel to accommodate PhD and trainees of various capacity building programmes. It is proposed to have three blocks of 100 rooms each with dining facilities. The design and drawings and estimate for hostel accommodation infrastructure and the abstract estimate will be submitted separately.

The facilities available at Kurseong, can be effectively utilized for conducting different academic as well as capacity building programmes of IIFM. The CAFÉ campus at Kurseong may be transferred in favour of IIFM and handed over so as to declare as a second campus of IIFM to cater to the needs of North Eastern States and West Bengal. This will minimise the infrastructure requirement and development at IIFM, Bhopal for running the various ongoing programmes of IIFM to the approved capacities.	



Establishing IIFM Campus at Kurseong will facilitate the institute to focus more on the Eastern Himalayan States and West Bengal in terms of academic, research, consulting and capacity building, development and mobilisation. Kurseong will act as a base for reaching out to North Eastern States like Sikkim, Assam, Arunachal Pradesh, Meghalaya, Nagaland, Manipur, Mizoram and Tripura and provide academic and research programmes specific to the region.

The IIFM campus at Kurseong can evolve as an International Centre of Forestry to attract more students and researchers from south east Asia, Asia and other countries.

Establishing a second campus of IIFM at Kurseong will reduce to an extent the infrastructure requirement of hostel, class room and other utilities at IIFM, Bhopal campus to run various ongoing and new academic, training and research programmes.

The hostel requirement of atleast 120 students of IIFM can be immediately met from Kurseong and two courses can be easily conducted from Kurseong campus. The convocation hall old and new can be converted into two class rooms and used for running the regular classes for Post Graduate Programmes.

The programmes can be organised in such a way that one or two trimesters of the Post Graduate Programmes in Forestry Management and Sustainability Management may be conducted at the Kurseong campus. For example, the first two trimesters of 1st year programme of Sustainability Management is organized in Kurseong and 5th or 6th trimester of Forestry Management may be organized at Kurseong, thereby academic and training activities will be conducted at Kurseong throughout the year.

Once the new courses are launched, the first year programme of two courses namely Development and Sustainable Finance, and Climate Resilience and Carbon Management may be conducted in one year and the second year programme of other two courses namely Conservation and Livelihood Management, and Sustainable Development may be conducted in next year in a cyclic manner so that the students get the chance to live in both the campuses i.e., Bhopal and Kurseong as part of their two year programme. In this way the assets available at Kurseong is put to best use which will reduce the infrastructure requirement of the main Bhopal campus.

The maximum intake of students per programme is 60 thereby the hostel facilities of 120 rooms can be used effectively to accommodate 120 students. This will reduce the demand for hostel facilities on the main campus of HFM.

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In addition to the Post Graduate programmes, some of the Management Development Programmes or Executive Development Programmes, IFS compulsory courses organized at IIFM may be conducted at Kurseong, thereby the infrastructure and other facilities of Kurseong are fully utilized. The two conference halls and one class room of 40 seater capacity available at Kurseong may be effectively used for organizing MDP/EDP and compulsory training programmes.

The one week and short duration programmes will attract more participation as Kurseong is located close to Darjeeling, a major tourist site and a hill station. Gangtok, Sikkim is also close to Kurseong.

The faculty required for handling academic, training and research activities can visit the campus and stay during the course. Once their inputs are given, they can go back to Bhopal and other faculty can join. Thus, there are no additional facilities required and the faculty can stay in the existing quarters, which can be renovated and kept maintained.

The sports facilities established at Kurseong namely the football ground, basketball, volley ball and tennis court may be put to use for the students of Post Graduate Programmes and officers of compulsory courses, MDPs/EDPs.

At present IIFM, Bhopal campus does not have the required number of rooms to accommodate students of all academic programmes at a time (two running programmes along with four proposed new courses). If two programmes are run at Kurseong campus alternately for one trimester, it will help in off campus exposure as well in smooth running of all programmes.

The building and other assets of the campus can be effectively utilized by taking up repair and renovation whenever necessary, for conducting the various ongoing and proposed academic research and training programs of IIFM. It will also revive and restore the activities in the Kurseong campus by organizing year round programmes and thereby the facilities can be effectively utilized.

Major repair and renovation of the main building and other buildings assets need to be carried out to declare the IIFM campus at Kurseong and to start the academic and training activities in the campus at the earliest. The proposal also includes construction of a 6 room guest house to accommodate the visiting faculty and other guests and perimeter boundary wall with chainlink fence. CPWD, Gangtok, Sikkim who has got the jurisdiction is preparing the estimate for repair and renovation, construction

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Among the diverse coastal habitats, mangroves are the most dominant ecosystem along the Indian coast. MISHTI Programme is focused on mangrove restoration with following features:

- (1) MISHTI is to be implemented by converging Compensatory Afforestation Fund Management and Planning Authority (CAMPA) Fund, Mahatma Gandhi National Rural Employment Guarantee Scheme (MGNREGS), and other sources.
- (2) Categorization of Targeted areas for this programme:
 - a. Mangrove plantation/restoration of gap or degraded areas or accretion areas,
 - b. Mangrove restoration of mudflat areas (areas that had historical mangroves),
 - e. Mangrove restoration in abandoned aquaculture ponds & salt pans, and
 - d. Rehabilitation of areas infested with invasive or alien species having mangrove potential.

The Programme will cover approximately 540 sq km area across nine (9) coastal States and four (4) Union Territories in five years (2023-2028). It will create around 22.8 million man-days with estimated carbon sink of 4.5 million tons of Carbon. It will also create potential areas for nature tourism and livelihood potential for local communities.

Implementation Process

For implementation of the proposal, funding will be done from State CAMPA = National CAMPA & MGNREGA and also from other sources. This dovetailing of funds will be well formulated at village, panchayat, district and State level.

Activities

The Core activities undertaken by State CAMPA will include Restoration through Gap Plantation; afforestation; and enrichment plantation. The funding for activities other than core activities will be done through National CAMPA, MNREGA and other sources. Any gap in financing through State CAMPA will be considered by National CAMPA.

The core activities include-

- a.) Mapping and delineation of target intervention areas
- b.) Preparation of inventory based on scientific assessment of topography, hydrology etc.
- c.) Nursery Development
- d.) Mangrove Restoration/Plantation

In addition, the support activities, funded by the National CAMPA and other sources will supplement the implementation on the MISHTI Programme and in achieving its mandate and include-

- a.) Livelihood Diversification activities
- b.) Awareness and Capacity Building
- c.) Research and Development

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- d.) Publicity, Media and Outreach
- e.) Monitoring and Evaluation
- f.) Ecotourism with the help of SHGs
- g.) Development of Interpretation Centres

- Workshops
- Exposure Visits.

However, one of the major constraints of these programmes has been the lack of quality planting material and its availability and accessibility to the growers. Establishing plant nurseries and equipping manpower with the requisite skills is vital to achieve the target of a green India. The quality of planting material must receive greater emphasis in order to ensure that the country is able to enhance forest and plantation productivity to meet increasing social demands and achieve the carbon confiscation target. Growing tree is an art as well as science of our social life. The process of growing a forest artificially usually begins with the raising of good quality plants in the nursery.

Model Nurseries play important roles in production and supply of quality planting stocks of important tree species. A good nursery stock is a pre-requisite for a quality plantation. A healthy and vigorous stock is essential for ensuring good survival and growth of any plantation. This can be achieved only if nursery is properly designed and all nursery operations are conducted cautiously. The success of nursery depends upon:

- i. Selection and development of suitable site.
- ii. Efficient supervision and administration.
- iii. Adequate planning, forecasting, control procedures and orderly timing of operation.
- iv. Use of appropriate cultural and traditional methods.
- v. Protection of plantation with fencing and boundaries.
- vi. Arrangement of regular supply of suitable water and use biofertilizer.
- vii. Soil testing is necessary for nursery. It will be tested by local department/laboratories of university/institutions.
- viii. Protection from pests, diseases and other damages.

Justification:

Modern nurseries are vital for plantation activities, especially in the context of reforestation, afforestation, and sustainable land management. The need for modern nurseries in restoration ecology is detailed below:

- ➤ Seedling Production: Modern nurseries are essential for producing high-quality tree seedlings to ensure a healthy and uniform forest or vegetation restoration process.
- > Species Selection: Nurseries allow for the controlled cultivation of a wide variety of tree species. This is important because it enables the selection of species that are well-suited to local climate conditions, soil types, and ecological goals, whether that's timber production, ecosystem restoration, or carbon sequestration.
- ➤ Genetic Diversity: Nurseries can maintain genetic diversity within tree populations through cultivation of plus trees. This provide protection from diseases, pests, and environmental changes, which are often more vulnerable.

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- ➤ Efficient Resource Use: Modern nurseries are equipped with advanced technologies that optimize resource use. These include efficient irrigation systems, precise nutrient management, and controlled environments, which reduce resource waste and increase seedling survival rates.
- > Timely Planting: Nurseries can produce seedlings year-round, allowing for planting during optimal seasons. This ensures that trees have the best chance of establishing themselves successfully in the field.
- Research and Development: Nurseries often serve as centers for research and development. They can be used to test new planting techniques, evaluate the performance of different tree varieties, and develop best practices for plantation management.
- Training and Education: Nurseries provide opportunities for training and education, both for professionals in the field of forestry and for local communities. They can be used to teach sustainable land management practices, seedling care, and the importance of trees in ecosystem services.
- Environmental Benefits: Forests created through well-managed nurseries contribute to various environmental benefits, such as carbon sequestration, soil conservation, watershed protection, and habitat restoration. The CEO, National Authority presented the brief background of the case in which National CAMPA was impleaded as respondent no.104 by Hon'ble Madras High Court by its order dated 8.06.2023 in the above cited case related to relocation of villages from Mudumalai Tiger Reserve. Subsequently an affidavit was filed. However, Hon'ble Madras High Court passed the order on 8.08.2023.

- 2. NTCA vide letter no. 1-10/2008-NTCA dated 16.08.2023 has informed National CAMPA about the order of the Hon'ble Madras High Court dated 08.08.2023 with following directions: -
- i) the respondents no. 104 and 105 to forthwith provide funds by releasing the same to the National Tiger Conservation Authority/103rd respondent, who in turn will release it to the fifth respondent/Principal Chief Conservator of Forests, State of Tamil Nadu, within a period of two months from the date of receipt of the copy of the Order.
- (ii) the sum thereof shall be disbursed and the relocation carried out within a period of one month thereafter.
- (iii) Call this matter on 10.10.2023 for reporting compliance.
- 3. In this case respondent no 104 is National Authority CAMPA and Respondent 105 is State CAMPA of Tamil Nadu. NTCA is Respondent No. 103.
- 4. National CAMPA had filed an affidavit before the Hon High court of Madras vide no. 964948/2023/NA dated 08.06.2023 when the case was heard.

5. BRIEF HISTORY OF THE CASE:

National CAMPA had received letter from National Tiger Conservation Authority (NTCA) no. 1-10/2008-PT dated 31.05.2023 alongwith order of Hon'ble High Court of Madras in no. W.M.P.(MD). No.1962 of 2022 in WP(MD) No.19771 of 2018.

- 6. High Court of Madras directed that the order has to be complied and the fund may be released with a caveat that if there is any change in the decision on relocation the fund shall be returned back to the Ministry of Environment, Forest and Climate Change, Government of India. NTCA requested that necessary funding support for the voluntary relocation of the said village is provided by the CAMPA.
- 7. Subsequently Hon'ble High Court of Madras at Chennai issued an order dated 8.06.2023 which is related with the matter regarding the rehabilitation of Thengumarahada Villagers in which the Hon'ble Court has impleaded the National Authority, CAMPA represented by its CEO as respondent no.104.

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8. The Hon'ble Court also ordered to issue notices to the newly impleaded respondents (National CAMPA) returnable by 5.07.2023. The matter was posted to be heard on 5.07.2023.

In this connection, it is to apprise that vide its order dated 16.09.2022 the Court ordered as follows:

"The learned Additional Advocate General is directed to take instruction from the Government to the effect that as the entire package of Rs. 15 lakhs/ family has been agreed to be paid by NTCA, whether the State Government is willing to identify certain lands for granting free house pattas to them".

9. Subsequently, in the order dated 16.03.2023, Hon'ble High Court of Madras in Chennai ordered.

"Learned Advocate General is requested to convey the order of the court to the Chief Wildlife Warden, Tamil Nadu, to forthwith send the reply. In event we find that the same is only procedural in nature, already our positive direction to the National Tiger Conservation Authority stands. Upon receipt of the procedural reply which is to be sent by the Chief Wildlife Warden, Tamil Nadu the National Tiger Conservation Authority shall consider the same and pass order releasing the amount within two week therefrom "

10. Consequent upon receipt of this order by NTCA, it sent a letter no. F.No. 1-10/2008-PT dated 31.05.2023 asking funding support from CAMPA for the voluntary relocation of proposal of Mudumalai Tiger Reserve which was responded by National Authority vide its letter no. NA-4/3/2023-NA dated 6.06.2023 wherein it was clearly stated that -

"The Rule 5(2) (h) of CAF Rules, 2018 provide that the NPV Fund of State CAMPA can be utilised for voluntary relocation of villages of protected areas. However, the State has very limited NPV Funds available which would not be sufficient for relocation of villages. These funds should be prioritised for improvement of forests and wildlife habitat for enhancing and compensating of ecosystem services."

11. The National Authority, CAMPA made following submissions before Hon'ble High Court of Madras:

Hon High Court was apprised through Affidavit and further submissions in the form of a letter through Additional Standing Counsel engaged by Authority by filling an affidavit with following content: -

- (i) The Compensatory Afforestation Fund Act, 2016 hereinafter referred as CAF Act, 2016 was enacted by the Parliament on 3rd August, 2016 and the Compensatory Afforestation Fund Rules, 2018 were notified on 10th August, 2018. The Compensatory Afforestation Act and Rules came into force on 30th September, 2018 for providing a statutory mechanism for compensating the loss of forest land and ecosystem services due to diversion of forest land under the Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980.
- (ii) CAMPA funds are to be utilised as per the provisions of the CAF Act for undertaking compensatory afforestation, artificial and assisted natural regeneration to compensate the loss of forest and create and enrich forest biodiversity for improvement in quality of forests and the wildlife habitats including augmentation of fodder and water for wildlife.
- (iii) The Compensatory Afforestation funds are meant for raising of site-specific mandatory compensatory afforestation stipulated in the approvals accorded as per the provisions of the Forest

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(Conservation) Act, 1980. The funds realised as Net Present Value (NPV) are utilised for improving the quality of forest cover, conservation of biodiversity and enhancement of ecosystem services for compensating the loss of ecosystem services due to diversion of forest land.

- (iv) CAMPA funds are an additional fund for compensating the loss of forest land and ecosystem services due to diversion of forest lands for non-forestry purposes and are not to replace normal State funds for administration, protection, and management of forests.
- (v) The management, conservation and protection of forests and wildlife, creation and strengthening of forest related infrastructure, mitigation of human-wildlife conflict and other ancillary activities are primarily the responsibility of the concerned State Government or Union Territory Administration.
- (vi) The permissible items of works and activities under Net Present Value are provided in the Compensatory Afforestation Rules, 2018 (CAF Rules).

The Rule 5(2) (h) of CAF Rules, 2018 provides that the NPV Fund of State CAMPA can be utilised for voluntary relocation of villages of protected areas. However, the State has very limited NPV Fund available which will not be sufficient for relocation of villages. These funds should be prioritised for improvement of forests and wildlife habitat for enhancing and compensating of ecosystem services.

- (vii) Further, there is Rs. 4,33,41,998/ available under NPV fund of Tamil Nadu State and the State Government of Tamil Nadu/CEO, State CAMPA has submitted APO for the year 2023-24 which does not indicate utilisation of the above mentioned amount towards relocation of villages from Tiger Reserve as per Rules, 2018.
- (ix) Further, there is no provision for spending any fund from the National Fund for relocation of villages from protected areas in the CAF Act, 2016.

The provisions under Section (5) of CAF Act, 2016 is given as under: -

Save as otherwise provided in this Act, the monies available in the National Fund shall be disbursed and utilised in the following manner namely: -

- (a) ninety per cent of the all monies collected by a State, which has been placed under the ad hoc Authority and the interest accrued thereon, shall be transferred to the State Fund established in such state under sub-section (I) of section 4;
- (b) the balance ten per cent of all monies collected by the States and Union territory administrations, which has been placed under the ad hoc Authority and the interest accrued thereon, and all fresh accrual to the National Fund, as provided in sub-section (4) of section 3, and the interest accrued thereon, shall be utilised for meeting
- (i) the non-recurring and recurring expenditure for the management of the National Authority including the salary and allowances payable to its officers and other employees;
- (ii) the expenditure incurred on monitoring and evaluation of works executed by the National Authority;
- (iii) the expenditure incurred on specific schemes approved by governing body of the National Authority.

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Explanation: - For the purpose of this section, "scheme" includes any institute, society centre of excellence in the field of forest and wildlife, pilot schemes, standardisation of codes and guidelines and such other related activities for the forestry and wildlife sector.

(x) Therefore, it was submitted that the State Government should arrange necessary funds from the State budget for the rehabilitation/relocation of village from the protected area.

Hearing held on 6th June, 2023

On 6th June,2023 the matter was heard in the High Court of Madras. Govt. Counsel had sent a message to appear virtually in the court, so CEO CAMPA appeared. During the course of hearing court read out provisions of WL Protection Act according to which NTCA is supposed to support the relocation of villages from Tiger Reserves, Shri Murali, IG Forests representing NTCA expressed that over the period fund allocation to NTCA was getting reduced, therefore NTCA is also approaching CAMPA for financial support. Hon'ble Court asked views of CEO CAMPA who stated -"that CAMPA is a special act enacted to meet specific purposes of compensating the loss of forest land & ecosystem services due to diversion of forest land.

The CEO, National CAMPA explained the relevant provisions of CAF Act and Rules. He mentioned that NPV has been levied as per direction of Hon'ble Supreme Court and now as per provisions of the CAF Act. Though the CAF rules 5 (b) provide list of activities for utilisation of NPV under and the Rule 5(2)h allows for the voluntary relocation of villages from protected areas. However, fund available with State CAMPA of Tamil Nadu is very limited and even considered by National Authority it would be insufficient to meet requirement.

The CEO, National CAMPA submitted before the Hon'ble Court that apart from whatever support is possible from State CAMPA, the State Government should meet the cost of relocation of villages as it is also their primary responsibility.

There were two VC meetings held, one on 11th July and second on 12th July with Government Counsel and Additional Solicitor General Chennai. We had received mail also from Standing counsel wherein it has been mentioned that Hon'ble High Court wants to know the statistics of fund available with National Authority as well as State Authority. In view of VC and mail letter addressed to Senior Penal Counsel was sent.

The Court Case No. W.M.P (MD) No. 1962 of 2022 in WP (MD) No. 19771 of 2018 came up for hearing on 6th July, 2023 after impleading of the National CAMPA as Respondent No. 104 by the Hon'ble Madras High Court regarding support from CAMPA for voluntary relocation of villages from Mudumalai Tiger Reserve. It was explained to the Hon'ble court in the virtual hearing that though the provision for voluntary relocation from NPV exists in the Rule 5 (2) (h) of CAF Rules, 2018.

Kind attention of the Hon'ble Court was invited to the fact that the Compensatory Afforestation fund is meant for raising of site-specific mandatory compensatory afforestation stipulated in the approvals accorded as per the provisions of the Forest (Conservation) Act, 1980. The funds realised as Net Present Value (NPV) are utilised for improving the quality of forest cover, conservation of biodiversity and enhancement of ecosystem services.

It was emphasised that CAMPA funds are special and additional fund for compensating the loss of forest land and ecosystem services due to diversion of forest lands for non-forestry purposes and are not to replace normal State funds for administration, protection, and management of forests.

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The Hon'ble Court was informed that the management, conservation and protection of forests and wildlife, creation and strengthening of forest related infrastructure, mitigation of human-wildlife conflict and other ancillary activities are primary the responsibility of the concerned State Government or Union Territory Administration.

However, the PCCF & CEO, State CAMPA argued before the Hon'ble Court for seeking their intervention for obtaining Financial support from the National Fund. The IGF, NTCA Regional Office, Bangalore who represented NTCA also informed that the funds under Project Tiger have been reduced and it will not be possible for NTCA to meet the expenditure for relocation and informed the Hon'ble Court that NTCA is also dependent on CAMPA funds for its programmes. However, it is pertinent to add that NTCA is supported by a separate CSS and through the mandate of the WLPA, whereas the CAMPA is governed by a separate legislation.

Further, the next hearing was held on 10th July, 2023 wherein the Hon'ble court wanted the view of the Ministry of Environment, Forest & Climate Change. During the hearing the Authority was represented by Joint CEO, CAMPA and NTCA was represented by its IGF. The IGF, Project Tiger & Elephant also clarified the situation. Hon'ble Court directed for furnishing of availability of funds under CAMPA including National Fund.

Accordingly, the Govt. Counsel was informed vide National Authority letter dated 12th July, 2023 detailing the following fund position which was placed before the Hon'ble High Court in the hearing held on 13th July, 2023.

Status of State Fund (90%) available under CAMPA as on 31.03.2023 is Rs. 20,082.84 crore (Rupees Twenty thousand eighty two crores and eighty four lakes only).

Details of CAMPA fund of Tamil Nadu:

Deposit upto 7th February, 2019 – Rs. 168.69 crore

Centre share (10% of total deposit)- Rs. 16.86 crore retained by National CAMPA as per CAF Act, 2016.

Total State Share (90% of total deposit) – Rs. 151.82 Crore

Funds released to State CAMPA from interest - Rs. 38.40 crore

Funds transferred to state – Rs. 113.41 crore in August 2019, the details of which are:

- CA Rs. 31.8 crore
- CAT Rs. 0.85 crore
- IWMP Rs. 0.51 crore
- NPV Rs. 60.02 crore
- Interest Rs. 6.66 crore
- Others Rs. 13.47 crore

iii. Current Status of Fund available with National CAMPA in respect of Tamil Nadu State as on 30.06.2023 is Rs.43.45 crore. which include State share (90%) Rs. 39.10 crore, National Authority share (10%) Rs. 4.34 crore. Out of the State share of Rs. 39.10 crore, NPV is Rs.7.71 crore and CA is Rs. 26.57 crore, this amount is yet to be transferred to Tamil Nadu CAMPA.

In addition, following was submitted through our Counsel before the Hon'ble High Court-

- (i) The voluntary relocation of village from protected areas is governed by Rule 5(2) h of CAF Rule, 2018 this is among one of the thirteen activities prescribed to be carried out by the 80% of NPV fund available with State CAMPA.
- (ii) The provision of voluntary relocation of villages from protected areas exits in State Funds, and National Authority has not considered any such proposal under the National Fund. Proposals for such voluntary relocations have been approved from State Fund in respect of Maharashtra, Madhya Pradesh, Karnataka and Odisha etc. Therefore, it may not be possible to consider the proposal of Tamil Nadu State Government for providing funding support from National Fund.
- (iii) The State Government has primary responsibility for protection, conservation and sustainable management of forest and wildlife and in case there is limited availability of central assistance under Central Sponsored Schemes, it should use State Fund for the purpose.
- (iv) The NPV funds have been realised pursuant to the directions of Hon'ble Supreme Court of India for compensation of loss of ecosystem services due to diversion of forest land and are to be spent for comprehensive improvement in quality of forests, enrichment of biodiversity and improvement of wildlife habitats.
- (v) It was reiterated that CAMPA funds are a special fund realised as Compensatory Levies from User Agencies in lieu of diversion of prime forest land with the main objective of compensating the loss of forest land and ecosystem services. It is an additional fund not meant to replace budgetary support for regular schemes/ programmes of Central/ State Governments. Compensatory Afforestation, restoration of forest landscapes and improvement of ecosystem services require long term commitment, sustained efforts with continuous flow of funds from CAMPA. It is not advisable to exhaust this precious fund expeditiously in activities where other routine/ regular funding support is available in State/ Central Sponsored Schemes.
- (vi) CAMPA funds are non-lapsable and interest bearing. Tamil Nadu has not informed how much is the total interest amount accumulated which the Government has deposited annually in State CAMPA Funds on Rs. 113.41 crore transferred in August, 2019.
- (vii) National Authority will consider APO of Tamil Nadu received recently (on 07.07.2023) and approve suitable amount as per CAF Rule 5 for the purpose considering all other important activities, spill over and committed liabilities.
- (viii). It was submitted that National Fund is used for specific purposes with the approval of the Governing Body on schemes, pilots, monitoring etc. It is not a replacement of normal funding support under Central Sponsored Schemes or any regular / routine Government Schemes/



Programmes. This also doesn't provide partial funding for such programmes. If this proposal is given a finality by the Hon'ble Court, other States will also start approaching National CAMPA with similar proposals for funding support to their routine schemes/ programmes and the National Fund will be exhausted in no time.

So far, National CAMPA has approved Annual Plan of Operations of the States of Karnataka, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, and Odisha for voluntary relocation of villages from the protected areas under NPV component of State Fund according to Rule 5(2) (h) of the CAF Rules, 2018. No fund from National Fund has been approved for such purpose.

Hon'ble Supreme Court in its judgement dated 26th September, 2005 in the Writ Petition (Civil No. 202 of 1995) observed that the Fund generated for protecting ecology and providing regeneration should not be treated as a Fund under article 266 and article 283 of the Constitution.

In this connection, the National Authority is seeking all Court orders, relevant documents and pleadings submitted by State Government, State CAMPA and NTCA for taking suitable legal recourse in the matter.

The Executive Committee is requested to consider and take a view in this regard.

DECISION OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:

The Executive Committee discussed the matter in detail in the light of the preamble and relevant provisions of the Compensatory Afforestation Fund Act, 2016 and CAF Rules, 2018. The EC held the view that National fund has a different purpose which supports schemes/ pilot projects and are not meant to supplement the activities which are already covered under any scheme of Central or State Governments. In the instant case there is already a centrally sponsored scheme of Project Tiger which also supports the relocation of villages. However, it has been noticed that the State Government has never made any attempt to seek financial support under the centrally sponsored scheme for the said purpose. The primary responsibility of relocation of villages lies with the State Governments and the role of the Central Government is limited to providing policy support as well as through Centrally Sponsored Schemes.

It was reiterated that the CAMPA funds are an additional fund for compensating the loss of forest land and ecosystem services due to diversion of forest lands for non-forestry purposes and are not to replace normal State funds for administration, protection, and management of forests. Providing financial support from National Fund for the purpose of relocation of villages will set a wrong precedence which would also constitute as deviating from the cardinal principle on which the CAF Act, 2016 has been enacted and is violative of the letter and spirit of Supreme Court' Orders in this regard.

The Executive Committee thus directed CEO, National CAMPA to obtain legal opinion and based on the same, and if advised, approach the Hon'ble Supreme Court of India for appropriate relief, in the said matter.

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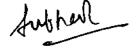
