- To populate the existing RhoDIS-India database with the sampled rhino horns. This will be the largest Indian rhino genetic database across the world.
- To preserve the historical rhino DNA samples for any future use. With the technological
  improvements in the context genomic tool these samples can be used in near future for
  genomic studies.
- To combine the rhino, horn genetic data with the modern RhoDIS data and assess any changes in rhino STR allele frequency over last 40 years.
- Use all these information to develop future management plans for rhino translocations within Assam as well as potential translocations to the other populations across India.

#### **Project Outcomes**

- The major outcome of this project will be accurate quantification of the historical rhino genetic variation in Assam. As these stockpile samples represent the allele frequencies of last 40–50-year time period across the state, they are extremely valuable information in terms of comparative analyses.
- The RhoDIS-India program has generated the current allele frequencies from all the rhinobearing regions within Assam and inclusion of the historical data will give us quantitative information on any possible allele change scenarios over last 4-5 decades. Such information from tigers have shown changing genetic structure patterns in north India.
- The genetic data will use to assess uniqueness of the populations, private alleles (if any), relatedness (within and between populations) and conduct analyses to evaluate historical population connectivity and demographic history scenarios. It will have important implications in future rhino translocation plans. Apart from this the data will have valuable use in forensic studies and possible future genomic work.

# STATUS OF VETTING OF DATA ON PROJECT-WISE COMPENSATORY AFFORESTATION AGAINST EACH PROPOSAL OF FOREST LAND DIVERSION SINCE 1980 BY THE REGIONAL OFFICE

The vetting of data on project-wise Compensatory Afforestation (CA) for forest land diversion proposals since 1980 by the concerned Integrated Regional Offices is still under progress.

- 2. Till now, the reconciliation data has been received from 27 States/UTs, while 4 States namely Bihar, Mizoram, Sikkim, and Uttarakhand, have yet to submit their data to the National Authority. Additionally, for Punjab State CAMPA, a letter was received from the concerned Integrated Regional Office (IRO), which did not contain the required data.
- In terms of information received from the IROs, vetted reconciliation data has been received for 9 States/UTs namely Jammu & Kashmir, Madhya Pradesh, Manipur, Meghalaya, Odisha, Rajasthan, Tripura, Telangana and Uttar Pradesh. Incomplete reconciliation data have been received from concerned IRO for 3 States/UTs namely Andaman & Nicobar Islands, Kerala, and Tamil Nadu. The vetted reconciliation data is still awaited form 20 States/UTs.

#### ESTABLISHMENT OF VAN VIGYAN KENDRA IN STATES

Establishment of Van Vigya Kendra for benefit of Tribal and Forest dependent communities in the State of Uttarakhand, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Odisha, Chhattisgarh. By adopting a holistic, community-driven approach, Van Vigyan Kendras can play a transformative role in enhancing the livelihoods of tribal populations while contributing to sustainable forest management. State governments are urged to act swiftly, leveraging existing infrastructure and aligning efforts with National priorities. State governments should be encouraged to utilize and revitalize existing underused infrastructure for VVKs. The existing infrastructure including buildings can be repurposed/ renovated for training/ dissemination of scientific knowledge and sharing of traditional best practices among forest dwelling communities. Van Vigyan Kedra facilities as knowledge sharing platform will also facilitate sustainable and scientific management of community forest resources leading to economic development for tribal communities.

Proposals should clearly outline expected outcomes, a defined timeline, and measurable impact on forest conservation and tribal livelihoods. VVKs can also serve as centres for research and innovation, focusing on the sustainable use of forest resources and tribal knowledge systems. Collaboration with local universities, research institutes, and Forest dept. can help in documenting traditional ecological knowledge, developing new technologies for NTFP processing, and fostering innovations that improve the quality of forest-based products.

For the successful implementation of VVKs, States should prepare a proposal for development of one Pilot van Vigyan Kendra in the State at a suitable location based on the respective Forest Department's cost norms or State Schedule of Rates (SOR). These plans should be integrated into the State Annual Plan of Operations (APO) or Supplementary APOs.

National Authority has received one proposal from Jharkhand for setting up of Van Vigyan Kendra as pilot project with an outlay of Rs. 10.00 crore for the period of 5 years for dissemination of technologies developed by Forest research institutes, forest -based industries and individual farmers for strengthening livelihood of local/tribal communities.

A team of senior forest officers from Jharkhand, Chhattisgarh, Odisha, Madhya Pradesh, Uttarakhand, Gujarat and Maharashtra visited Nandurbar and Dhule district of Maharashtra coordinated by Shri Girish Kuber, Member of the Executive Committee to have first hand experience of community managed CFRs in Baripada and Krishi Vigyan Kendra at Nandurbar.

The proposal is to approve setting up of a Van Vigyan Kendra on Pilot Basis in the States of Chhattisgarh, Jharkhand, Madhya Pradesh, Maharashtra, Rajasthan, Gujarat, Uttarakhand. The work can be undertaken from the NPV funds of the State CAMPA through APO of the respective States. The Executive Committee may also consider adding other States. The Interest Component can be utilized for recurring expenditure on the VVKs.

### **PUNJAB STATE AUTHORITY**

### PERSPECTIVE PLAN OF COMPENSATORY AFFORESTATION

The Punjab State CAMPA vide letter no. State Authority/8201 dated 26<sup>th</sup> September 2024, has submitted an agenda for the in-principle approval of an Additional Action Plan for the financial year 2025-26 to 2030-2031 to carry out CA and allied activities. This request is in compliance with the Hon'ble Supreme Court's order dated 7<sup>th</sup> August 2024 in the case of T.N. Godavarman Thirumulpad v. Union of India & Others, I.A. No. 5891 of 2019.

- 2. Punjab State CAMPA, submitted an affidavit dated 20<sup>th</sup> August 2024, stating that a surplus of approximately **Rs. 220 crore** remains available under the Compensatory Afforestation head after allocating **Rs. 270 crore** for the maintenance of CA plantations in the coming years.
- 3. In State's Executive and Steering Committees, it was decided that future action plans for CA from 2025-26 onwards should be increased by an average of **Rs. 55 crore** annually compared to the previous five years.
- 4. Out of the targeted 21,833 hectares of CA plantations, Punjab State CAMPA has achieved 96.35% (21,037 hectares) by 31<sup>st</sup> December 2023. Only the plantations for ongoing projects remain pending. Surplus funds have accumulated due to the completion of the maintenance period for plantations raised during the Adhoc CAMPA regime.
- 5. The surplus funds, including those from the Adhoc CAMPA, are proposed to be used for raising additional afforestation activities under the CA component. A tentative additional action plan for plantation and allied activities from 2025-26 onwards has been submitted for in-principle approval.
- 6. The Punjab State CAMPA seeks approval from the National Authority for the additional action plan in the upcoming meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Authority. The detailed plan, including site details and KML files, will be submitted following in-principle approval.
